double doors with a five-light transom above and five pane sidelights. A one-story porch frames the opening. The first floor facade windows have nine-over-six pane sash, with jack arches above and narrow wooden sills below, while the second floor openings have six-over-six.

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The layout of the house is composed of a central hall with a room off each side. All of the original woodwork remains intact.

Mason County, he bought 600 acres of land near Middletown. Sometime after this date Abell built the present brick house. He bought and sold a great deal of land in the Jefferson County area. Abell died in 1843.

The house was purchased in 1865 by Thomas Lee Jordan of West Virginia.
