

SUMMARY

The William Oswell Ralls House, located at 640 West Whidden Street in Arcadia, Florida, is a two-story frame vernacular dwelling that was constructed in two phases. It was originally a one-story, two room residence constructed c. 1905. The two-story addition was added c. 1915. The house has an irregular ground plan a brick pier foundation, drop siding exterior walls, and a multi-gable roof sheathed with composition shingles. The main fenestration consists 1/1-light and 2/2-light double-hung wood sash windows Decorative wooden garlands adorn the window trim on all elevations. The one-story porch extends along the main facade to where it abuts the original portion of the residence and has a concrete deck that replaced the earlier wooden structure. The porch is sheltered by a flat roof supported by square wooden columns, and the roof deck is bordered by a balustrade composed of square posts topped with small finials, molded railings, and simple balusters. The front-gabled east section of the house reportedly had a one-story porch that wrapped around the side. This porch was removed at an unknown date. Formerly open porches at the rear of the house were enclosed c. 1960 to create a family room and laundry room. The wood frame garage located at the rear of the property was constructed c. 1960 and is considered a noncontributing resource. The interior of the house contains three bedrooms, a parlor, kitchen, dining room, breakfast room, music room, family room, and two baths. A large open area near the second floor landing has been designated a sewing room.

SETTING

The city of Arcadia is the county seat of DeSoto County, Florida. The population of Arcadia was 6,604 as of 2000. According to the U.S Census estimates of 2005, the city grew to 7,151. Arcadia's local economy is heavily reliant upon agriculture. Primary agriculture elements include citrus, cattle and watermelons. Additionally Arcadia has experienced a surge in home development due in part to residents relocating from surrounding counties and commuting to their work destinations. During the winter months many retirees from the Midwest relocate to Arcadia, which provides a needed contribution to the local economy. The setting of the Ralls House has changed considerably since the original portion of the building was constructed about 1905. The house was originally located on a large un-subdivided parcel of property just west of the original subdivisions that formed the City of Arcadia. The house was originally surrounded by a large orange grove owned by the Ralls family. In 1948, it was incorporated into the Ralls Addition of the City of Arcadia. With the creation of the subdivision and the subsequent development of the Ralls tract, the groves were eliminated. The present site of the Ralls House measures 3/4 of an acre, which remains relatively large when compared with surrounding lots and parcels containing buildings of more recent construction. A noncontributing garage is located at the rear of the property.

PRESENT AND ORIGINAL APPEARANCE

Exterior

South Elevation

The Ralls House is a two-story Frame Vernacular residence. It was constructed in two phases, originally being a one-story, three room building, which was incorporated into the east elevation of the present house. The original section was constructed c. 1905. The two-story main block of the house was added c. 1915. The building has an irregular ground plan and is oriented north-south with the main (south) elevation facing West Whidden Street (Photo 1). The residence rests on a brick pier foundation, has a balloon frame structural system and drop siding exterior fabric. The main block of the house has a steeply pitched cross-gable roof with open eaves. The three-bay front porch extends along the main block of the south facade until it meets the one-story east wing of the house which comprised the original residence. The porch has a concrete deck and is covered by a flat roof supported by square wooden columns. The roof deck is bordered by a wooden balustrade composed of finial topped newel posts united by flat balusters and hand and foot rails. The first story facade of the main block of the building features a pair of 1/1-light double-hung wood sash windows and a wood and glass panel main entrance door surmounted by a single-light transom. The one-story east wing, which directly abuts the front porch, has a front-facing gable roof and a pair of 2/2-light double-hung wood sash windows. The second story of the main facade has three pairs of 1/1-light double-hung wood sash windows. All of the original windows in the house have similar frame and trim details. Decorative wooden garlands have been added to the window frames on all elevations.

East Elevation

The east wing of the house (Photos 2-4) is one-story in height and has a front-facing gable roof Like the main body of the house, the exterior walls are sheathed in wood drop siding. It rests on a brick pier foundation and has two 2/2-light double-hung wood sash windows on its east wall that are separated by a small one-light hopper window that illuminates one of the two bathrooms found on the first floor. The other bathroom is found in an addition that also contains the family room. This section of the house has a hip roof, surfaced with galvanized sheet metal in a V-crimp pattern. This section appears to have been created by the enclosure of what was an open porch at the northeast end of the house.

North Elevation

The north elevation includes the original portions of the house, an enclosed porch and a one-story kitchen wing (Photo 5). The enclosed porch is located behind the original one-story wing and west of the bathroom addition. The porch extends along the north elevation of the one-story, early portion of the house. Windows are

aluminum awning. The breakfast room found immediately west of the family room is accessed by a wood and glass jalousie door found at the top of cast concrete steps. A one-story kitchen wing is located to the rear of the main two-story block. A brick chimney stands at the intersection of the kitchen wing and the two-story section of the house. On the east elevation of the kitchen wing is a small addition or porch enclosure containing a laundry room. Both the laundry room and breakfast room feature jalousie windows. These areas were remodeled c. 1960.

West Elevation

The west elevation (Photo 6) features both the one-story kitchen wing and the two-story main block and kitchen wing. The kitchen wing exhibits a pair of 2/2-light double-hung wood sash windows. The main body of the house has both single and paired examples of 1/1-light windows, and a small 1/1-light window illuminates the upstairs bathroom. A tall narrow exterior brick chimney that warms the downstairs parlor rises above the sidegable roof.

Noncontributing Garage

A noncontributing one-story wood frame garage (Photos 7-8) constructed c. 1960 stands at the rear of the property. It has an L-shaped ground plan and rests on a continuous poured concrete foundation. Like the main house, the exterior walls are sheathed in drop siding. The intersecting gable roof has open eaves and is surfaced with galvanized sheet metal in a V-crimp pattern. The front of the garage has a two-vehicle-wide entrance bay, and the side ell contains another small vehicle bay with a lift door. On the south side of the ell is a wood and glass door that allows access to the building without opening the vehicle door.

Interior

The floors throughout the interior are made of heart pine. The interior wall and ceiling finishes in the c. 1905 section of the house are plaster over wood lath, whereas the c. 1915 section exhibit painted tongue and groove siding for both the walls and ceiling. The main door features glass windows in the upper panels of the main door and transom above. The window and door moldings are simple. Most of the interior doors are multi-panel wood types that retain their original hardware. The French doors connecting the dining room and kitchen are also original.

First Floor

The interior of the Ralls House contains major spaces on the first floor. The principal entrance provides access to an entrance foyer and open stairs (Photos 9-10). An original parlor with a simple fireplace is located on the west side of the foyer and was part of the original portion of the building (Photo 11). Adjoining the parlor is a

dining room (Photo 12), and a kitchen (Photo 13) is located immediately north of the dining room. The breakfast room (Photo 14) is found east of the kitchen. The east side of the first floor contains an enclosed porch now used as a family room (Photo 15), a music room (Photo 16), and a bedroom (Photo 17). The music room and bedroom were part of the original c. 1905 section of the house. There are two steps at the bottom of the stairs in the foyer that made it necessary to construct corresponding steps for the downstairs bedroom door (Photo 18).

Second Floor

The second floor is accessed by the flight of stairs that ascends from an entrance foyer (Photos 19). A wooden balustrade lines the hall side of the stairs to the second floor landing, which is also bordered by a similar balustrade. The balustrade consists of a stringer, flat balusters, a handrail and newel posts. Historic stenciling remains in the east wall of the main stair (Photo 20). The large open area of the landing is used as a sewing room (Photo 21). There are two bedrooms (Photos 22-23) and a single bathroom on the second floor (Photo 24).

Alterations

Exterior

The Ralls House maintains its original physical appearance to a large degree. Alterations to the exterior include the removal and replacement of the original c. 1905 one-story front porch, which was replaced by the c. 1915 two-story porch. An ell was constructed on the east elevation prior to World War II to create a bathroom. The bathroom fixtures have been modernized. An exterior porch at the rear of the building was enclosed as a sitting area and a laundry room around 1960.

Interior

The original residence did not have interior bathrooms. Most of the interior alterations were made to accommodate the bathroom fixtures and kitchen appliances. All major rooms retain their original features and finishes. The interior alterations appear to be long-standing and embody the physical development of the building and its adaptation to modern needs and a contemporary use.

SUMMARY

The William Oswell Ralls House is significant at the local level under Criterion C in the area of Architecture. It is a distinctive example of a two-story Frame Vernacular residence built in the early decades of the twentieth century that was later expanded as the Ralls family grew in size. It is one of the few remaining examples of a large pioneer home constructed in Arcadia and DeSoto County before the 1920s. The house exhibits many features of early 20th century construction in Florida through its use of materals, massing, and simple decorative details. Except for the enclosure of formerly open porches at the rear of the house to create additional living and utility spaces, the house largely retains its c. 1915 appearance. Windows, doorways, wall finishes, and hardware are mostly original.

HISTORICAL CONTEXT

Citrus cultivation was one of the major economic activities in Arcadia beginning in the 1880s. A freeze in 1886 severely damaged citrus crops and trees throughout the North Florida citrus belt along the St. Johns River. South Florida, including DeSoto County, benefited from the disaster as citrus growers began moving southward to more frost-free regions. The railroads, the State of Florida, and large real estate companies joined in promoting land sales, promising great profits from citrus cultivation. By 1891, there were thirty-six citrus growers in Arcadia and its environs. They owned approximately 400 acres of grove land in Arcadia and produced an estimated 34,000 boxes of fruit annually. Most of the land within the present corporate limits of Arcadia was planted in citrus groves.

William Oswell Ralls

William Oswell Ralls was a prominent Florida citrus grower, timberman and saw mill owner. He was born on December 26, 1858, in Russellville, Monroe County, Georgia. He was the son of William Oswell Ralls and Cassandra Hardin, both Georgia natives. Annie Causey Ralls was born in Seville, Volusia County, Florida, on January 29, 1871. She and the younger William O. Ralls were married in Seville on March 1, 1899. At the time of his marriage, Ralls was a well-established entrepreneur. He was owner of Ralls and Gunn, manufacturer of long-leaf yellow pine lumber. He owned large parcels of land that provided timber for his lumber operations. In Arcadia, he was also a partner in Heard, Ralls and Reynolds, a firm specializing in growing, purchasing and brokering commercial citrus. One of Rall's partners was J.J. Heard, a pioneer Florida banker and businessman.

William Ralls and his wife were part of the migration of citrus growing families from North Florida to the milder climate of South Florida. Prior to relocating to Arcadia, the Ralls lived in Maitland in the Central Florida citrus region. According to family records, W.O. Ralls' business interests in Arcadia date to as early as 1900. In August 1904, Ralls and a partner, John K. Treadwell, bought a parcel measuring approximately ten acres from E.A. Thomas for \$12,000. This parcel encompassed a substantial portion of what today is the northwest portion of the city of Arcadia. The parcel included the present location of the Ralls House. In April 1905, John Treadwell sold his interest in the property to Ralls, who had the original residence constructed on its present site the same year.

Although William Ralls died in December 1906, the Ralls family retained ownership of the property for more than ninety years. The present house dates primarily from c. 1915, when the building was enlarged from a three-room one-story structure to its present two-story appearance. Annie Ralls, resided at the home until her death in 1957. The Ralls' daughter, Ella, a school teacher in the DeSoto County schools for many years, resided at the home until shortly before her death in January 1996 at the age of 95. In 1948, the family created the Ralls Addition to the City of Arcadia and over time sold the surrounding grove lands for redevelopment as residential property. In 1997, surviving members of the Ralls family conveyed their home to the present owners Bruce Neveau and Dennis Tyson. The construction of the Ralls House and other early residences was part of the development of Arcadia from a sparsely populated frontier settlement to an established community during the years between 1886 and 1905. Its completion was the result of the efforts of William Oswell Ralls, one of the most important citrus growers and entrepreneurs in Arcadia during the city's initial period of development.

ARCHITECTURAL CONTEXT

Frame Vernacular

The Frame Vernacular style was the most popular form of residential architecture in Florida from the Territorial Period (1819-1845) to the present. "Frame Vernacular" is defined as the standard wood construction techniques of lay or self-taught builders. Local builders relied on readily available materials and their own designs and experience during the construction process. The Industrial Revolution allowed for the standardization of building materials and elements. Furthermore, magazines and catalogs helped perpetuate building trends and

ideas. The railroad was used for low-cost, efficient transportation of manufactured building products. Many popular vernacular building forms were used by builders during the late-nineteenth and early twentieth century.

Frame Vernacular residential buildings were generally one or two stories in height and utilize a wood frame structural system situated upon brick or concrete pier foundations. A variety of plans were employed including rectangular, ell, and irregular footprints. However, one of the most popular plans consisted of a rectangular central unit with projecting room extensions. Earlier forms generally exhibit steeply pitched pyramidal, hip, or gable roofs clad with either wood shingles or metal surfacing such as standing seam or 3V crimp; however, many of the roofing materials have been replaced with composition shingle. Common exterior wall surfaces included weatherboard, wood shingles, drop siding, and board and batten. Windows were generally double-hung with a 2/2-light configuration being most popular prior to the Civil War. While later forms also exhibit the 2/2-light configuration, 1/1-light windows also gained popularity. Additional features generally included front or wrap-around porches. Exterior decoration was sparse and limited to ornamental woodwork, balustrades, knee braces, purlins, and exposed rafter ends under the eaves.

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE

The William Oswell Ralls House is significant as a distinctive example of Frame Vernacular construction which dates from c. 1905-1915, the period when the northwest section of the city of Arcadia was being developed. The house is irregularly massed and reflects two phases of construction. The first phase was a one-story, threeroom front gabled type of dwelling. About 1915 a two-story side gabled addition was added to the one-story structure. The addition enlarged the dwelling considerably and altered it exterior appearance. The size of the house grew with the number of family members. The addition has a boxy form with an ell-shaped ground plan and a one-story kitchen wing on the north elevation. The ell-shaped plan was likely an accommodation to the Florida climate to facilitate cross ventilation of the interior. The ell plan of the house is formed by the north and east elevations of two-story portion. In addition to its distinctive plan and massing, the Ralls House embodies many of the other features and materials associated with early wood frame residences in Arcadia and other parts of Florida. One of these is the use of heart or long leaf yellow pine for construction. The use of this was favored by home builders in the late 19th and early 20th centuries because of its durability and resistance to termite infestation. Ralls was a manufacturer and dealer of yellow pine lumber in Arcadia, and the lumber for construction of the house was supplied from his firm. The interior of the house exhibits many features that represent its early construction and period of development. The construction is simple and lacking ornamentation. The turned newel posts on the staircase are one of the few concessions to decoration. The fireplace in the parlor has a simple wooden mantelpiece and paved outer hearth. The main decorative element is the marble facing of the firebox. Only simple narrow moldings mark the intersection of the walls, ceilings and floors. The doors also have simple molded jambs and lintels.


