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## Description

This is a larger-than-life-size bronze soldier, set on a high granite base. The soldier stands with legs apart, his left hand at his belt, the right at his side. The face is impassive and expressionless. He wears a disheveled infantry uniform, rough shoes, the shirt collar open and askew, the sleeves rolled back, the knee torn open, his helmet on the ground behind his left foot. The sculpture is 7'9'' tall, 2'7' wide, and 32'' deep. A holster hangs from the belt on the soldier's right hip. The sculpture is signed: "Pietro Montana/SC/1927.''

The base of the monument is grey granite and is 6'4'' high, 3'2'' wide, and 3'6'' deep, with small foliate designs carved at the corners. Rectangular bronze reliefs, 2'x2'8'', with arched tops are set on the front and each side of the Each is signed in the same fashion as the sculpture. base. The front relief reads: ''ERECTED TO THE MEMORY/OF THE CITIZENS OF EAST/PROVIDENCE WHO SERVED/IN THE WORLD WAR/1917\*1918/DEDICATED JULY 30, 1927/IN MEMORIAM." Listed in two columns below the inscription are twenty-three names.

The left relief depicts a marching infantry column, one man on horseback, four on foot. The right relief depicts an artillery scene--four or five men load a cannon. The relief on the rear side of the base shows a nurse assisting two wounded soldiers, with an indistinct battle scene in the background.

The sculpture is in moderately good condition. The surface is stained and pitted, but there do not appear to be any missing parts or any breaks in the surface. It is located in front of a school, now converted to housing, near the city's civic center.

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## Significance

East Providence's World War I Memorial (1927) is historically significant as the city's principal effort to honor those who served in the first World War and because it is an unusually successful depiction of the soldier in battle. Unlike other war monuments which show military figures in stock poses, this expressive figure stands as if he has just arisen from the heat of battle, with legs apart and athletic physique revealed by his torn uniform. Through posture and bulk the sculptor has given the figure monumentality, somewhat like Michelangelo's <u>David</u>, a reference which is underscored by the infantryman's oversized hands (one of which is dynamically half-clenched in tension), powerful musculature, and massive head.

Pietro Montana (1890-1978) was a painter as well as a sculptor. He was born in Alcamo, Italy, and studied at the Art School of Cooper Union; he was working in New York when he modeled this soldier. Montana was an active sculptor into the 1950s. His works include a number of war memorials, though no others in Rhode Island. His clients included many Catholic institutions in and near New York City.

Though primarily commemorative in intent, the <u>World War I</u> <u>Memorial</u> achieves historical significance as East Providence's expression of honor for its citizens who served in the war.
