On the north side of Stephen Decatur Memorial Road, Maryland Route 611, on Lower Sinepuxent Neck in Worcester County, approximately nine miles south of United States Route 50, stands a two-and-one-half story brick building on "Genesar" tract. The house is in very poor condition but is being stabilized for future restoration.

The Architectural Historian and authority on transitional Maryland architecture, Dr. Henry Chandler Forman, FAIA, frequently cites this building as having some of the most unique pattern brickwork diapering in Maryland. It has extensive diamond and chevron glazed brickwork patterns, which are covered with a nineteenth century thin coat of stucco. As transitional architecture, it represents the hold-over forms of mediaeval work and the earliest development towards the more formal Georgian ideals in plan and design. Dr. Forman records drawings of the unique interior woodwork which has been removed. Because of these unusual architectural features it is considered an important early Maryland building.

Its 1971 appearance is little more than a ruin. The south facade is braced with poles extending from a trench in front of the house to the second floor level. A portion of brickwork in the east corner has fallen away, from the ground level to the roof; only a few frames remain at the windows and doors. Temporary supports have been installed to deter further decay. Large portions of the main cornice remain in place and the chimneys are structurally sound above the roof.

Originally, the south facade, forty-five feet in length, had four bays at the first floor level and three bays at the second floor level, symetrically placed. The two center bays of the first story were formerly doors, one leading into the stair passage, the other into the "Great Room". The first story of the north side was similar, but had only two windows on the second story. It had one small window at the stair landing level.

Each gable end, 19 feet 3 1/2 inches wide, had small windows at the first and second floor levels flanking the fire-places at each floor level. On the gable at the attic floor level there is a projecting belt course, above which is glazed diapering. The "A" roof, pitched 51 degrees, has a "kick" to the eave. Originally there were three dormers on the south front, matching the one existing dormer on the north side of the roof.

The interior originally had two large rooms, approximately 15 feet by 16 feet and 18 feet by 16 feet, opening from either -see continuation sheet-

The house is the only currently known structure of its type on the Eastern Shore of Maryland. It is in very poor condition and is in danger of vandals and the elements. The present owner plans to form an organization to restore the building. It is only two miles from the visitors' center of the Assateague National Seashore, therefore the structure could be a potential tourist attraction as well as a creditable addition to the annual Maryland House and Garden Pilgrimage.

The original Genezir land patent, consisting of 2,200 acres was granted to Colonel William Stevens in 1676. He was appointed one of the eight commanders of the Eastern Shore in 1665; one of eight justices for Somerset County in 1666, which county then consisted of the present counties of Somerset, Worcester, and Wicomico. In 1669, he was the representative for Somerset County to the Maryland General Assembly. He is sometimes referred to as the first citizen of Somerset County. Although a member of the Church of England, he was partially responsible for the introduction of Presbyterianism in Maryland. He resided at his plantation "Rehoboth", on the Pocomoke River.

In 1681, Colonel Stevens sold Genezir to Edward Whaley and Charles Ratcliffe, who in turn divided the land into two equal parts of 1,100 acres each, Ratcliffe taking possession of the part on which the house now stands. Charles Ratcliffe left his dwelling plantation (700 acres) to his son Charles Jr. in 1696, who later left it to his only daughter, Elizabeth (1709).

John Purnell and Elizabeth Ratcliffe were married in 1719, thus bringing the property into the Purnell family. It is believed that the present brick house was constructed during this period, c. 1732. In 1754 John Purnell willed the property to his son Zadock, who at his death, willed it to his daughter, Sally M. Spence, and after her death, to his grandson, Zadock Spence. In 1867 it was sold to Zadock P. Henry, in

side of a central passage from which a staircase rises. The ceiling joists were exposed with molded edges. There was probably a partition parallel with the front of the fireplace, creating closets beside the fireplace, which would have been lighted by the small windows in the gable wall, according to local practice. The second story rooms had similar treatment but had plaster ceilings, as the beams are unmolded. Photographs and drawings are extant for the "Great Room Chamber" (second story west room), which had three walls with raised paneling. The fireplace wall was plastered, with closet doors and a Federal style mantel.

The main staircase was enclosed, creating a need for the small window recently discovered beneath the stucco on the north facade. The brick wall is one brick thinner in the east corner, and formerly had a small enclosed winding staircase. The small windows were placed so that each closet and passage had a source of light.

In the early nineteenth century, the east staircase was removed. At the same time the enclosure of the central staircase was removed and it was refitted with Federal style spandrels and balustrade. The fireplaces appear to have been altered and

the decorative ceiling beams covered with a board ceiling. The two exterior doors in the "Great Room" were bricked-up, made into windows, and trimmed accordingly. Several of the small gable windows were also bricked-up. An ornate moulded cornice with dentils and swags was installed on the south facade, as it appears today.

At the East end of the house lie the foundations of an early kitchen. Photographs taken in the 1930s show a brick structure of later date than the main house.
