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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The General Giles House, constructed in 1791 is a 2 1/2 story t-shaped frame structure. The house has a hip roof with 2 inside end chimneys. There are two pedimented dormers with returns on the facade. The windows are 12 lights over 12 lights flanked by three panel (raised) shutters on either floor. The main entrance features a modern pillared (Ionic) portico and a brick stoop. The front door has 6 raised panels with a wide lockrail. The foundation is New Jersey sandstone and the cellar windows have the original wrought iron bars. There is a modern portico to the east side of the house that has a wooden stoop and a six panel door with wide The rear section is $1 \frac{1}{2}$ stories with an inside lockrail. end chimney, pedimented dormers, and 9 light over 9 light window openings. The property is surrounded with a wrought iron fence. There is a brick walkway around most of the house and a brick patio in the rear of the house.

Inside, the house has random width pine floorboards throughout. The first floor has a center floor plan with parlors to either side. There is a square arch in the main Several of the rooms on the first floor have hand hallway. carved wooden Adams mantles with detailed reeding, pilasters, and full entablatures. The mantle in the west (front) parlor also has carved figures, laurel wreathes and a small King of Prussia marble border between the hearth opening and the mantle. There are cornices and chairrails throughout the house. In many rooms the original bookcases and closets that flank the fireplaces still remain. The stairway is Ushaped with nosed treads and stringboards. The balasters Throughout the interior many original doors and are turned. hardware remain. Original interior hardware includes large boxlocks, iron knob latches with lockbars, iron thumb latches, H-L hinges, and large strap hinges.

Alterations to the house include the conversion of the east part of the first floor into a professional office, the closing of several fireplaces, the erection of the side porch, a new front stoop, and the installation of modern plumbing and heating facilities.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

SPECIFIC DATES 1791

The General Giles House, built in 1791, is one of the most distinct examples of Georgian Architecture that can be found in the state. Architecture, Legal and the Military are the areas of significance for the General Giles House.

This broad 2 story, 5 bay, hip roof articulation was typical of the finer Georgian Mansions of the Middle Atlantic area. But this type is almost never found in South Jersey, where vernacular conservatism prevailed. Therefore, the Giles house, a full blown Georgian Mansion, is a rarity. Moreover, the Mansion survives intact complete with the original windows, panel doors, H - L hinges, brass locks, floorboards, and Adams mantles.

General James Giles had a lengthy and distinguished career as a military officer during the American Revolution. He first distinguished himself as a lieutenant in the Second (New York) Artillery Regiment. Later he was attached to a Regiment that fell under the command of the Marquis de Lafayette. Prior to the cessation of hostilities, he received his commission as General. With the conclusion of fighting, he resigned from the military to enter civilian life.

In 1782 General Giles undertook the study of law under the supervision of Joseph Bloomfield, who became one of the three Bridgetonians to hold the Office of Governor of New Jersey. After marrying Mr. Bloomfield's sister, General Giles moved to Bridgeton (1788). There he set up his legal practice which quickly grew to be highly lucrative.

General Giles was also active in the community serving as the County Clerk from 1789 until 1804. In 1791, General Giles and some other prominent individuals of "Bridgeton" helped establish the Broad Street Presbyterian Church. A dispensation was granted to General Giles, late secretary of the General Lodge in the state of New York and Master of St. Johns Lodge number 2 of New York in October of 1790 authorizing him to institute a lodge in Bridgeton. In November, Brearley Lodge number 9 was instituted with Giles as Master and chartered in June 1791. He held the office of high priest in Brearley H.R.A. chapter number 6 from 1815 = 1820.

William E. Potter came from a prominent family in Bridgeton. The Potter Family came from Ireland in 1740 with the Presbyterian emigration. He received his law degree from Harvard in 1861 and was continuing his education at Princeton, when he enlisted in Company K, Twelfth Regiment New Jersey Volunteers. In 1866, he was commissioned aide-de-camp to Governor Marcus L. Ward, of New Jersey, with the rank of lieutenant-colonel. Colonel Potter took part in many battles during his enlistment: Chancelorsville, Gettysburg, Petersburg, and Appomattox Court-House to name a few. In company with five other officers he was detailed to deliver the colors surrendered by General Lee's army, to Honorable Edward M. Stanton, of the War Department, in The ceremony occurred on May 1, 1965. Washington. He was the only New Jersey officer present on this occasion. Colonel Potter was a delegate to the Republican Convention in 1868, 1876 and as an elector on the Garfield ticket in 1880.

Recently the present owner of the Giles house, Dr. James Maurice Gates, passed away (1977). Here is how the Bridgeton Evening News described Dr. Gates in a brief editorial from the "Scribbler". "The death of Dr. Maurice Gates removes another noted physician from our midst. He was a Bridgeton boy in the truest sense, graduating from Bridgeton High and choosing a career in osteopathy for his life's work, and returning here to practice. Dr. Gates was interested in many things, especially in the Red Cross where he served as a director. Dr. Gates also was interested in the city's historic past and resided for many years in the General Giles House on West Broad Street. Our community will miss this tall, courtly gentleman who served his profession so well and so tirelessly."
