DESCRIPTION The Ingebrigtsen-Hinseth Farmstead consists of a main house, a gable barn, and four other out-buildings. Constructed in 1900, the house is a large cubical, two story structure with beveled siding and an irregular stone foundation. The hipped roof of slight pitch is bracketed under the eaves and is truncated at the top. The house's most prominent feature is the two story Eastlake-like porch, with bracketed posts, spindled upper hieze, and turned balusters. The lower level is screened in while the upper level is open, and the entire design is topped by a shingled pedimented gable with bargeboard in its peak. Most of the windows on the house have entablature and slipsill surrounds. The house is symmetrical in design except for a small one story addition to the left facade. A medium sized gable barn, constructed in 1902, has a cupola straddling the ridge at the center of the structure and a small gable addition on the right facade. The remaining structures were also constructed around the early 1900's, and are in good period condition.

SIGNIFICANCE

The Ingebrigtsen-Hinseth Farmstead is significant in two areas: architecture and agriculture. All the buildings on the farm are good examples of their type of construction and have not been altered dramatically. They represent the larger types of structures that were built during the early 1900's with the house being an excellent example of various Victorian movements including Eastlake and classical elements. Because most of the buildings were built within 10 years of each other, the farmstead provides a picture of agriculture at the turn of the century. Although Stengrim Ingebrigtsen received the U.S. patent for this land in 1878, there are apparently no structures left from the late 19th century. Most of the structures were constructed by Mathe C. Ingebrigtsen who owned the property from 1884 to 1923. He then sold it to Albert O. and Ole S. Hinseth. The farmstead has remained in the Hinseth family since that time. It is believed that Eric Loe was the carpenter who built many of the building
