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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This twelve room house, constructed of hard-burned brick, has the mark and general appearance of a mid-19th century house. The gable roof is slate covered. The white-bracketed cornices on the porch columns and the medallioned entrance door have fine Victorian details. These details are similar to the details of the South Church entrance porches.

The side hall provides entrances at both east and west sides of the building. The detailing of 10' high ceiling rooms have rich plaster cornices and a plaster medallion for the central hall lighting fixture. The parlor and library fireplaces are white marble. The hand-carved mahogany newel post and balusters are features of the main staircase.

The three bay 2 1/2 story unit has floor to ceiling 6/9 sash on the front facade. The lintels are sandstone as is the foundation. The gabled roof has a return with brackets under the eaves. Appended to the south of this three bay unit is a two story two bay wing. The south wall is of random coursed sandstone (giving credence to the tradition of an earlier building on the site), but was apparently completely rebuilt when the main unit was constructed in 1861.

Entrance from the front porch on the east side of the unit through the medallioned double doors leads into the side hall, 8'6" wide, facing the mahogany-railed staircase with a panelled base, under which is a stairway to the cellar, and the west side double doors. On the right of the hall is the living room, 16' x 17', with two large east windows reaching to the floor (6/9) and 1 north window (6/6) and a marble face fireplace. The north and west windows have panelling to the floor.

On the left of the hall is the dining room, 22' x 15', with a restored fireplace, panelled and framed with a bolection molding, a built-in cupboard, and a back stairway. The south wall of the house is red sandstone taken from the original house. The cellar runs the length and width of the house and consists of two large rooms, a photography darkroom, and a preserve closet. There is a modern brick fireplace in the larger room.

The second floor of the main wing has two bedrooms matching the first floor and dressing room and bath (added); the smaller wing has three bedrooms and bath, with a square hall leading to the back stairway. There is a crawl space over the small wing and a large high attic over the main wing.

There are two front porches extending the length of the house on the east leading on to a flagstone and brick patio, surrounded by Old English boxwood.

The outbuildings are a three-room cottage, early 19th century, attached to a carriage house of the same vintage as the main house and now used as a garage. The small building is an original tool shed. Below the shed is a large spring, emptying into Long Swamp Brook. It is believed that this spring was a deciding factor in building the South Church on its site across the street from the house, as it provided fresh water for the horses and the congregation which enjoyed their noonday meal in the fine weather between morning and afternoon services.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Architecture

The South Church Manse is a good example of a vernacular Victorian house of the third quarter of the 19th century. Perhaps the best example of its type in Bergenfield, the house has a traditional New Jersey block form with a linearly projecting wing. The floor to ceiling first floor front fenestration is relatively uncommon in New Jersey, but particularly rare is the 6/9 sash in these windows. Otherwise the building exhibits a very conventional plan and was probably derived from an architectural plan book of the period. Its standard form, traditional motifs, but detailed features indicate that this building was constructed by one of Bergenfield's best mason/architects.

Religion

The former parsonage of the South Schraalenburgh Dutch Reformed Church served as the home of a series of domines from 1861 through 1918. The original parsonage on this site was partially destroyed by a Tory raiding party in 1776. Following the building of a new church in 1799, the parsonage was renovated and restored in 1806. In 1861 a major reconstruction left the house as it presently appears. It served as a parsonage and theological seminary until 1918 when it was bought as a residence by the family of the present owner, who made substantial interior restoration.

The house stands today on two handsomely landscaped acres, bound on the east by Long Swamp Brook and facing Cooper Park and the South Church and cemetery on the north. The church house, on extensive grounds, adjoins the house on the west.

The parsonage has therefore a rich, historic past and is an integral part of an impressive, unified assemblage of an architecturally harmonious group in a well landscaped setting.

The Manse was involved in countless social activities of the church since it was the only visible edifice within sight of the church for many years.

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The Manse was later the home of Adrian Coulter Leiby, a foremost historian on New Jersey, from childhood until his death in 1976. He was a lawyer, author and historian. He graduated from Middlebury College in 1925 and from Columbia Law School in 1929, where he was an editor of the Law Review. In 1929-30 he served as law clerk to Mr. Justice Harlan F. Stone, and thereafter practiced law in New York City, and was for many years a senior partner in the New York and Washington law firm of LeBoeuf, Lamb, Leiby and Mac Rae.

History became his avocation, particularly the history of Dutch New Jersey and the Dutch Reformed Church.
