The Jasper H. Stidham United Methodist Church, built in 1913, is a fine example of Gothic Revival with Craftsman influence style architecture. The church is set on a rural 3.19 acre plot several miles southwest of Lafayette. The landscape around the church is flat with a few mature trees. The building is a one and a half story structure built on a co-axial plan. The two rectangular sections of the church come together under a steeply sloped crossgabled roof.

The foundation of the church is a combination of cement block and poured concrete. All of the exterior facades are constructed of dark red flemish bond brick with a soldier belt course.

The main facade faces east. The bell tower is located on the south side of the main facade where the cross-gabled roof meets. The tower is decorated with tudor style battlements and flanked with masonry buttresses. The main entrance at the foot of the bell tower has a Craftsman style plain wood portico with simple bargeboard. Leading up to the double-leaf doors is a handicap ramp, which was constructed in 1984.

Roughly centered above the east bell tower entrance is a stained glass window set in a wood pointed cusped arch sash with a plain sill. An identical single window is located on the south bell tower. Two other identical windows, but on a smaller scale, are located on the south narthex section of the main facade. The fenestration of the windows progressing north of the bell tower is comprised of a three window arrangement, another three window arrangement, a two window arrangement and a single window. The windows are identical to those south of the bell tower. The window arrangements are separated by brick buttresses with stone ledges. The bell tower is flanked with identical buttresses.

The sanctuary (north) section of the west facade is identical to the sanctuary section of the main facade. The narthex or south rectangular section of the west facade is where the addition was connected to the original church. This addition was constructed to the church's southwest corner between 1957 and 1958. The addition is a one-story rectangular structure with a low pitched gabled roof. The facade of the addition is constructed of red brick to match the original structure.

The main entrance on the south elevation is identical to the bell tower entrance save the handicap ramp. There is a three window arrangement located west of the entrance. This arrangement is identical to those on the east and west elevation.

Centered below the steep gable of the north elevation is a gothic stained glass window. A plain wood door is located on the east side of this elevation, leading into the small room east of the sanctuary chancel area. A single pointed cusped arch sash is set on the west side of the north elevation.

The first floor of the interior consists of the narthex, sanctuary, chancel area, and a room on either side of the chancel. Above the narthex is a balcony level and a large classroom. Another classroom, three storage rooms, and the furnace room are below the narthex. The lower level and the second story are accessible through an open stairwell with wood balustrades inside the bell tower. The lower level walls are cement block and poured concrete.

The south entrance opens into the narthex and to the rear of the sanctuary. In addition, there is access to the sanctuary through the bell tower. The semi-circular chancel area is flanked by two doors with gothic trim which lead to small corner rooms. The northwest room has a door facing north that leads outside. The northeast room has access behind the large stained glass dome. The dome encompasses the area directly above the chancel area. The stained glass dome consists of geometric and floral patterns in an array of pinks, emeralds, rubies, velvetlike purple, and opalescent cream. Moving towards the top of the dome arch, the size of the various panes straighten. This gives a three dimensional appearance by adding a sense of depth.

The sanctuary has a vaulted ceiling with nine exposed beams. Two massive wood gothic arches supported by trusses span the width of the sanctuary.

The Stidham United Methodist Church meets criterion C for listing in the National Register in the areas of architecture and art. Stidham Church features a significant example of local artisan Edna Ruby's stained glass work. The church is significant locally as the only example of an ecclesiastical Gothic building with elements of the Craftsman style. The Gothic style is evident in the vertical design achieved through the bell tower, steep sloped roof, pointed arched sashes, and buttresses. The vaulted ceiling, massive wood arches, and arched doorways are elements of gothic architecture inside the sanctuary. The simple woodwork around the tiled roof and exposed purlins porticos, characteristics of the Craftsman style.

Jasper H. Stidham, a long time resident and land owner in Union Township, died on April 24, 1912. He left instructions in his will that a bequest of \$10,000 be used to incorporate a church near Taylor Station. The will further stated that the church was to be organized within six months of his death. Rev. George W. Switzer of Lafayette was appointed by Bishop W.F. McDowell of Chicago to implement the terms of the will.

By July, the first service was held in the Consolidated School Building of Union Township with the Articles of Association of the Jasper H. Stidham Methodist Episcopal Church being signed in September. In November, 1913, two acres of land were purchased for the sum of eight hundred dollars in the immediate vicinity of Taylor Station. Several months later, Charles W. Nicol was chosen as designer and the Joshua Chew Company was contracted to do the construction. The dedication service was held on May 16, 1915. Total cost of the land and the building came to approximately \$14.600.

Charles Wheeler Nicol, a Purdue graduate and senior partner of a Lafayette firm, designed over 1,200 buildings during his lifetime. Stidham United Methodist Church is the only ecclesiastical structure designed by Nicol that received an "outstanding" rating in the Indiana Historic Sites and Structures Inventory for Tippecanoe County. Three other Nicol structures were rated "outstanding" in the county survey. Located in the plat of Highland Park, these works include a Craftsman house, a Tudor

Revival house, and the William Blistain House, perhaps the best example of a Prairie style home in Tippecanoe County. Stidham United Methodist is significant as the only example of a Gothic/Craftsman Church designed by Nicol in his native county. The later work of Nicol is represented in the National Register through the listing of the Leland Hotel in Richmond, 1928 (NR 2-28-85) and the Roberts Hotel in Muncie, 1921 (NR 7-15-82).

The Stidham United Methodist Church represents the work of local master artisan Edna Browning Ruby. Miss Edna Browning Ruby worked hand in hand with architect Charles Nicol in her design and implementation of the art glass windows and dome. Both are excellent examples of ecclesiastical art glass for the period. The geometric and floral patterns in the windows can also be seen in the stained glass dome. The art glass is beautiful on its own visually, but is even more significant because of the association with nationally known artisan Ruby.

Miss Ruby was a graduate of the Art Institute of Chicago, Pennsylvania Museum and School of Industrial Art, and received honorary degrees from the Royal Academy in London. She was highly respected and honored in Indiana, the United States, and many parts of the world as an educator and an artist. She served as director of Applied Art at the John Herron Art Institute in Indianapolis (1913-16) and director of the Art School at Muncie National Institute (1916-18). Indiana Governor Samuel Ralston named Miss Ruby as the State Representative to the 1915 Panama-Pacific Exposition in San Franscisco. Ruby was honored as an "Outstanding Woman of Achievement" by the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs, an honor which carried the award of a tour of Europe. Miss Ruby lectured on the "design and manufacturing of textiles" across the country and in Europe, receiving several awards in Berlin, Paris, and London.

Edna Browning Ruby is clearly a significant person in women's history in addition to being an acknowledged master artisan. She was the only known woman in the United States who designed, built, and installed art glass windows. The fact that she was a native of Lafayette brings national recognition to her designs at the Stidham United Methodist Church. Miss Ruby designed art windows for two other intact churches in Lafayette, the Trinity United

Methodist Church and the New Christian Church. However, Stidham United Methodist is the only church represented with an art glass dome, a distinctive feature rarely seen in the works of Ruby. The dome is the primary focus of the sanctuary and is the best example of a Ruby art glass dome in her native state.

Verbal Boundary Description

Beginning at a point (A) where 175 West meets the church driveway, 230 feet north of 550 South. Then proceed north along the west line of 175 West turning west at the point (B) intersected by the south driveway of the manse. Then proceed 287 1/2 feet west (point C). Turn south and proceed to a point (D) intersected by an extended line along the north side of the church driveway. Then proceed east along the north side of the church driveway to the point of beginning (A).

Boundary Justification

The boundaries of the Stidham UM Church National Register nomination include only the immediate property surrounding the church building and the educational building addition.
