ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:	NAME: Lanier House
Situated on a corner lot facing west, this building is a one-story, irregularly massed, late turn-of-the-century frame residence. Hipped roof has irregularly introduced gables with a pair of gable roofs and two-bay pavilions at the northwest and southwest corners. Main entrance is a central single door with transom. Two four-over-four windows complete fenestration on the main facade. Fenestration on the secondary facade includes one four-over-four window and a single door with transom. A final single door with transom leads into the side of the southeast pavilion. Porch across two major facades has simple brackets and pedimented roof at southwest corner. Two exterior chimneys. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE: The Lanier House is an architecturally significant building within the context of Magnolia's extant historic resources. The residence is one of the more modest but well-preserved of the city's turn-of-the-century building stock. The irregular massing, gable-cornered L-shaped porch, and the unusual brackets supporting the porch posts make the Lanier House one of Magnolia's better one-story modified Queen Anne residences. The Lanier House, therefore, is significant as an excellent example of a vernacular architectural type used in turn-of-the-century Magnolia.	PHOTOS
