DESCRIPTION

The Dr. Cobb Pilcher House is one of the most notable examples of the International style in Davidson County. The dwelling was constructed in 1936 on a wooded lot south of downtown Nashville. Stanford Drive curves around two sides of the house and it shares lot lines with two adjacent parcels. The dwelling was enlarged into its present form in 1988 with rear one-story and two-story wings. This addition complimented the original design and its overall integrity remains intact. The dwelling is sited on the northern slope of a hill and is reached by a curvilinear driveway. The house is surrounded by dense woods and vegetation. At the rear of the house is a swimming pool and landscaped garden.

The Dr. Cobb Pilcher House is a two-story, concrete and brick veneer International style dwelling. The house has a concrete and brick foundation, exterior of stretcher bond brick, flat roof of rolled roofing material, and one interior brick chimney. On the main (north) facade is the main entrance with a twelve-light steel and glass door added in 1988. Over the door is an original flat roof concrete canopy. The main entrance is reached by a brick and flagstone staircase.

Windows in the dwelling are original eight-light steel casement design with flanking sidelights and transoms. The main facade has a projecting one-story bay window with steel casement windows. In the basement level of this projecting bay are windows with structural glass blocks. On the west facade is a garage wing with a two-bay garage in the basement. The garage bays have ca. 1970 overhead track wood doors. On the west facade's first floor level is an original single-light glass and wood door. On the east facade are two bays of windows of steel casement and structural glass block design on each floor.

At the rear (south) facade are two wings added in 1988 that were designed with detailing to reflect the original house. These details include steel casement windows and a brick veneer exterior. On the rear (south) facade of the original dwelling is a multi-light steel casement window in the kitchen section, and a narrow fixed steel window at the staircase. The original dwelling's horizontal form is expressed by two belt courses dividing the first and second floors, and by the brick coping at the roofline.

The interior of the house has original plaster walls and ceilings and original wood floors. The main hallway on the first floor features curved walls and an original central staircase with an original wood handrail and diagonal braced railing. The first floor features a living room, dining room, library, kitchen, two bathrooms, and the added master bedroom. The living room has an original Colonial Revival influenced fireplace with a marble surround. New recessed lighting was added to the ceilings in the main rooms and hallway in 1988. The library has added carpet on the floor, and retains an original Colonial Revival influenced marble mantel with vertical fluting. Flanking the fireplace are original bookshelves. Interior doors are solid wood design and some retain their original brass and porcelain hardware. The first floor bathroom has an original tiled tub and pedestal sink.

The second floor of the house has four bedrooms and two bathrooms. The bedrooms have original wood floors and original plaster walls and ceiling. Bathrooms on this floor have been remodeled although one bath retains an original tiled tub and pedestal sink. The master bedroom and bath on this floor were added in 1988.

At the rear of the dwelling is a concrete swimming pool added in 1988 which is included as a non-contributing structure.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Dr. Cobb Pilcher House is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under criterion C for its architectural significance as a notable example of the International style. The International style emerged in the late 1920s and early 1930s with an emphasis on smooth lines and modernistic design. Originating in Europe, this style was a break from traditional building and architects such as Le Corbusier and Walter Gropius brought the style to America's attention.¹ Styles such as Colonial and Tudor Revival were the most popular in Tennessee during the 1930s and few examples of the International style were built. The Dr. Cobb Pilcher House is one of two examples of the style in the City of Forest Hills (the other dwelling, the Henry Neuhoff House is also eligible for the National Register). The Dr. Cobb Pilcher House features eight-light steel casement windows, a projecting bay with structural glass block windows, and interior curved walls. The Dr. Cobb Pilcher House meets the registration requirements set forth in the Multiple Property Documentation Form, "Historic and Architectural Resources of Forest Hills."

The Dr. Cobb Pilcher House was constructed in 1936 and designed by the Nashville architectural firm of Warfield and Keeble. This architectural firm was prominent in Nashville during the 1930s, and was in business from 1929 to 1944. The firm's work was especially common in the Forest Hills area, where Keeble also made his home.² The Dr. Cobb Pilcher House is the only known example of the firm's use of the International style in Davidson County.

The large two-story International style dwelling came to be known as Deepwood for its position nestled at the foot of a hill along a thick grove of trees.³ The dwelling's modern style made it stand apart from other homes in the Forest Hills community, most of which reflected traditional Colonial and Tudor Revival styles. The dwelling's white curved walls, flat roof, and use of structural glass blocks made it a distinct landmark in its suburban neighborhood.

Dr. Cobb Pilcher (1904-1949), a neurologist at Vanderbilt University, was the original owner of the house. Pilcher was a Nashville native and graduated from the Vanderbilt School of Medicine in 1927. He interned at Brigham Hospital in Boston before returning to Vanderbilt in 1928. He also conducted work in neuropathology at the University of Chicago and neuro-surgery at Washington University in St. Louis. Pilcher became an associate professor of surgery at Vanderbilt and constructed this dwelling as his residence in 1936. He specialized in treating epilepsy, maladies of the nervous system, and the treatment of World War II brain injuries and was recognized worldwide for his achievements. In 1944, he established the William Henry Howe Fellowship at Vanderbilt for neuro-surgical training. Pilcher died unexpectedly at the age of forty-five in 1949 while residing at Deepwood. His death was perceived as a great loss to Vanderbilt and the medical community.⁴

Dr. Pilcher's wife, Laura Barbour Howe Pilcher, continued to own Deepwood until her death in 1967. The property was conveyed to the Pilchers' daughters, Laura Barbour Howe Pilcher Escobar and Mary Dudley Cobb Pilcher Saul, who sold the property to Dr. John W. McMahan in 1972. Dr. McMahan sold the property to the current owners, Tom and Connie Cigarran, in 1978. In 1988, the Cigarrans expanded the house with the addition of two rear wings. The firm of Tuck/Hinton Architects designed the additions, and the wings are in keeping with the original design of the house. The Dr. Cobb Pilcher House retains a high degree of its historic architectural integrity and is one of the most intact examples of the International style in Davidson County.

VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION

The boundary for the Dr. Cobb Pilcher House is that of parcel 47 on Davidson County Property Tax Map 131-13. The parcel is an irregular lot bounded on the north and east by Stanford Drive and on the south and west by property lines. The parcel contains the dwelling and an associated swimming pool.

VERBAL BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION

The nominated property includes the entire parcel historically associated with the Dr. Cobb Pilcher House. No other buildings or structures are associated with the property.




