Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The St. Elmo Historic District is an elongated area lying approximately 15-20 blocks in a north-south direction and 3-4 blocks wide in an east-west direction. The district contains over 700 buildings with 620 contributing to the architectural significance of the district. St. Elmo is located in a valley in the southern portion of the City of Chattanooga, adjacent to the Georgia state line.

Once an incorporated town, St. Elmo's boundaries are easily perceived and recognized; the former town limits now correspond to census tract (or ward) 18. Originally developed as a streetcar suburb away from the Chattanooga city limits, the area was rural and somewhat isolated in the 1870s and 1880s when development first began to occur. The northern boundary of the old St. Elmo Town limits is the Broad Street - Cummings Highway area where a distinct change in land use occurs.

To the west, the old Town limits lie adjacent to the undeveloped slopes of Lookout Mountain. This area is now a part of the Chickamauga and Chattanooga National Military Park, a National Register site managed by the National Park Service. To the south of the old Town limits is the Georgia State line. Across the line in Georgia, again, a distinct change in land use occurs. Instead of the single-family residential nature of St. Elmo, there is a small industrial and commercial area dividing St. Elmo from an undeveloped farming area of north Georgia. The boundary on the east is an undeveloped hill which divides St. Elmo from the Alton Park neighborhood. To the north of the hill is Forest Hills Cemetery which is adjacent to the Alton Park Area. From within these old St. Elmo Town boundaries, the district was selected to include an area containing sites of architectural and historical merit.

St. Elmo was planned as a streetcar suburb, thus the non-residential uses are few in number. One such area is along St. Elmo Avenue in the 53rd Street section; this portion of St. Elmo appears on the 1889 Plat Map as an area of residential development centering around a few commercial shops. The primary area of commercial use in St. Elmo developed around the Cross Roads section and lies to the north, outside the district. This area has become with Lookout Mountain a center of tourist activity and contains the Incline Railway (National Register). Land use within the district is largely limited to single family residential buildings. There are, however, a few apartment buildings and some lodges and hotels. Also within the district are churches and a school, as might be expected in a residential neighborhood.

Most of the houses in St. Elmo were built for the middle-income working class and represent vernacular trends in architectural styles. They are predominantly of frame construction and are one or two stories in height. Few outstanding examples of vernacular and revival styles for residential buildings occur. Architecturally, the most significant group of structures consists of public buildings. For instance, Thankful Memorial M.E. Church is an excellent example of the Gothic Style, and the St. Elmo Presbyterian Church is unsurpassed in Chattanooga for its portrayal of the Eastlake Style. Other styles represented include Gothic Revival, Tudor, Bungalow, Shingle, Queen Anne, Classical Revival variations, and Vernacular Styles such as the "Shotgun."

The cohesiveness of St. Elmo is accentuated by comparatively narrow, tree-shaded streets which reinforce the feeling of linear continuity. Set-backs are relatively uniform. The street pattern is not the traditional grid but rather an interesting pattern of parallel streets with curves and gentle angles resulting from the geographical contours of the area as well as the nature of the development which took place first along existing roads.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph) Criteria A,C

The history of St. Elmo can be traced to the late eighteenth century when it served as a trading area at the intersection of two major Indian trails. Known as the Cross Roads, it was the home of Daniel Ross, the father of John Ross. John Ross, founder of Ross's Landing - later to be Chattanooga - and a chief of the Cherokees, spent his early years at the Cross Roads where his father operated a deerskin tannery and trading stand. After the Civil War, the area was known as Kirkland or Kirklandtown after George Kirkland, who was the local postmaster.

St. Elmo, as it is now known, began in 1879 when A.M. Johnson began subdividing and developing his wife's farm which was south of the Cross Roads. At the same time, he and a group of investors opened and began selling plots in what became Forest Hills Cemetery. The Johnsons named this original subdivision East Side. In 1885 the Johnsons expanded the development and named the entire area St. Elmo. Also, in the 1880s, the Johnsons began constructing their own home in the St. Elmo area - on the site of the Ross homeplace (#716).¹ Although Forest Hills and St. Elmo were independent ventures, they were both initiated by A.M. Johnson, and lying adjacent to each other, they developed simultaneously. When St. Elmo was incorporated, the Cemetery was included within the town boundaries.

The name, St. Elmo, is derived from the title of the novel ST. ELMO by Augusta Evans Wilson. Considered by some literary historians to be the best known Southern female author of the nineteenth century, Augusta Evans Wilson has also been called the "foremost feminine propagandist of the Confederacy," and at least one of her books was banned in Union Army Camps. ST. ELMO was her fourth and most widely read novel. Its popularity assured her status in the post Civil War era as the South's most outstanding woman author.²

Set in the as yet undeveloped and picturesque valley adjacent to Lookout Mountain, ST. ELMO drew on Ms. Wilson's recollections of several summers spent at the Lookout Mountain Hotel as well as time spent in Chattanooga during the Civil War nursing her brother who had been wounded. From these memories, Ms. Wilson included in her novel many scenes which were familiar to area residents such as the local blacksmith shop, the Cross Roads, the bridge, graveyard and spring. The novel's popularity made it an obvious choice as a name for the new town being developed on the land that was its setting. (Also, Thankful Whiteside, the daughter of the man who owned the Lookout Mountain Hotel, and eventually the wife of A.M. Johnson, had been an acquaintance of Ms. Wilson during her summers spent at the Lookout Mountain Hotel.)

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

Even though some houses are in poor condition, most buildings in St. Elmo have been well maintained over the years. In an effort to improve and maintain their homes, many residents have added sidings such as asbestos shingles or have replaced wooden porches with iron railings. Community pride is strong within St. Elmo as evidenced by the excellently maintained churches and in the existence of neighborhood associations such as the St. Elmo Improvement League and the St. Elmo Optimists Club. While some structures are undergoing extensive rehabilitation by new residents in the neighborhood, most rehabilitative efforts are limited to maintenance-type work undertaken by long-time residents.

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


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

Adjacent to Johnson's farm, the town of East Side and soon to be the town of St. Elmo, Forest Hills Cemetery opened in 1880.



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Due to the excellent records at the cemetery, it is known that the first burial at Forest Hills occurred in August 1880 when an Englishman visiting in Chattanooga died. Over the next 100 years, a variety of persons were buried at Forest Hills--from Chattanooga's wealthiest and most prominent citizens to paupers and a "gypsy baby." The resulting collection of tombstone architecture is outstanding. A tremendous variety ranging from simple, unmarked stones to elaborate mausoleums exist. The use of motifs covers a broad range of symbolic messages: angels, anvil, trees, unfinished stonework, lambs, cut tress, draped monuments, palm leaves, and doves.

The decorative elements range from the ornate Victorian period with its garlands and fretwork to the more stark contemporary period.

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St. Elmo's development was also in large measure the result of Chattanooga's yellow fever epidemic of 1878 in which 366 people died. At that time, local residents became interested in summer homes on the nearby mountains. Since access to the mountains was often time-consuming and difficult, many people began looking at other areas nearer to but away from the downtown. During the following year, Johnson became involved in two major projects in response to these factors: East Side (later St. Elmo) and the Johnson Turnpike (now Ochs Highway). The Johnson Turnpike was constructed up Lookout Mountain as an improvement over the older Whiteside Turnpike which followed earlier Indian trails at a steep grade. Thus, the Johnson Turnpike allowed easier access to Lookout Mountain at lower toll rates. As such, the Johnson Turnpike became important in the development of Lookout Mountain as well as St. Elmo which lay at the base of the Turnpike.

Although the early development in St. Elmo was largely for summer homes, growth was steady and the area soon began to emerge as a town. St. Elmo's success over other areas can partially be attributed to its being Chattanooga's first suburb to have city water,³ its closeness to Chattanooga, and its easy accessibility. The accessibility was largely due to the trolley and later streetcars which first ran in St. Elmo in 1886. It was at this time that the name of the United States Post Office was changed from Kirkland to St. Elmo and that construction of the first church building (#346) was begun. By 1893, the horse trolley had been replaced by electric streetcars. In 1893, the Incline No. 2 was constructed in the "old" part of town, near the Cross Roads. As a result of the location and consequent tourist traffic, St. Elmo's main commercial center developed here. North of Johnson's farm, it is clearly distinguished from the residential portion of St. Elmo of which the district is comprised.

In 1905, for the purpose of building a school which was constructed the following year (#154), St. Elmo was incorporated as a town. Though incorporated, St. Elmo largely existed as a suburb of Chattanooga and was never an independently thriving commercial area. Instead, St. Elmo served as a "bedroom community" for nearby Chattanooga and was annexed by the city in 1929.


Growth, though steady, was initially slow in the 1880s, but by the 1890s development was occurring rapidly in St. Elmo as it became the home of some of Chattanooga's leading citizens including prominent families such as the Johnsons, Pattens, and Bates. Yet, the largest segment of the population was always middle income working-class residents who were employed in industries such as those in nearby Alton Park and by the Chattanooga Medicine Company which had been established in St. Elmo in 1879 by Zeboim Cartter Patten. As a result, St. Elmo became the home of a diverse population from the most affluent to the very poor. By the 1920s, access to Lookout Mountain and other areas had greatly improved, and many of St. Elmo's more affluent members left to live elsewhere. Thus, over the following years, St. Elmo changed to become primarily the home of the middle income working class.

Currently, the neighborhood exhibits some signs of deterioration but is primarily well maintained. Neighborhood pride can be seen in numerous homes that have had artificial sidings or alterations made primarily since World War II in an effort to "upgrade"

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or "improve" the homes. Today, the spirit of revitalization that exists in St. Elmo exists among many long-time residents who have lived in St. Elmo much of their lives as well as newcomers to the neighborhood.

The first incorporated "suburb of Chattanooga," St. Elmo's development played a large role in the history of Chattanooga.⁴ St. Elmo's rapid growth in the late 1800s led one local historian to state that "Chattanooga really is a suburb of St. Elmo."⁵ The area's growth and importance to Chattanooga is derived from three sources: a rapidly growing population, heavy tourist trade associated with Lookout Mountain, and the expansion of the Chattanooga Medicine Company (now Chattam Drugs) which has become a major cosmetic and drug manufacturer in the Southeast.

While historically a major component of Chattanooga's history, St. Elmo also possesses significance by its architectural distinctiveness. Primarily developed from the 1880s to the late 1920s, the area reflects various types of construction modes popular in that era.

Although a few stone and brick buildings appear in the district, buildings are primarily of frame construction and usually reflect the middle-income trends and standards of the owners and builders. Many such buildings defy definition as to architectural classification, but follow building styles popular during that period. For example, a typical house constructed in St. Elmo between 1890 and 1910 is exhibited in #163: a one story frame residence with a hipped gabled roof and L- shaped porch -- bargeboard optional. Variations of this same plan appear dozens of times within the district. During the 1910s, the common building style changed to the Bungalow; dozens of variations of this style appear throughout the district.

In addition to these examples of relatively widespread building techniques, other more vernacular trends appear. Several residences from the 1880s and 1890s exist that reflect the more rural atmosphere and larger lot sizes typical of St. Elmo at that time. Typical residences are #9, #10, and #586; probably the most outstanding example is #574. Known as the Hutcheson House, former Mayor William Crutchfield gave this house and eight acres of land to his daughter as a wedding gift in the early 1880s. These and other residences such as #543, #546, #387, and #588 reflect the graciousness of the area in its early stages of development just as #29 and #30 typify the rural nature of early St. Elmo reflecting fashionable trends in farm house architecture.


More definable architectural styles also exist in St. Elmo, but in smaller quantities. The Queen Anne style can be seen in houses such as #100, #385, #386, #511, and #566 even though the style in St. Elmo was never carried to its full eclectic and grandiose proportions. A very plain and modified vernacular Gothic can be seen in #241 and #573. Colonial Revival styling was present, though limited, and can be seen in houses such as #351. Other social and technological influences can be seen in three excellent "shotgun" houses as typified in #374, a relatively plain Mansard style house as seen in #411 (altered), and in a few examples of the artistic concrete block or artificial stone house as seen in #118 and #521. Another

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turn of the century style common in St. Elmo is a modified version of the Shingle Style; examples can be seen in #74 and #451 as well as #106 and #107. Later Revival styles such as the Tudor Revival is evidenced in #42 and #143, the Dutch Colonial Revival in #175, and the Spanish Revival in #584.

Probably the most outstanding group of buildings in St. Elmo is the churches. The first church building in St. Elmo, #346, was constructed by the Methodists in 1887. A relatively simple church, the building reflects Gothic influences as evidenced in the fenestration treatment. More refined Gothic influences can be seen in the St. Elmo Methodist Church (#316, built in 1921) which was designed by noted Chattanooga architect R. H. Hunt. While better examples of Gothic architecture can be seen in the St. Elmo Church of Christ (#159, 1913-1923) and the 1906 portion of the St. Elmo School (#154), the most outstanding Gothic design in St. Elmo is the Thankful Memorial Episcopal Church (#101, 1904-07). Built of pink limestone, the church was named for Thankful Whiteside Johnson, one of the founders of St. Elmo. Classical Revival styling can be seen in the St. Elmo Baptist Church (#328,1928) and the 1915 portion of the St. Elmo School (#154). The single most outstanding building in the district is the St. Elmo Presbyterian Church (#334, 1889). Featuring eclectic Victorian elements such as an asymetrical appearance, corner tower with slate covered polygonal roof, and varied exterior wood treatments, the Presbyterian Church is an outstanding example of the Eastlake style.

Overall, the architecture in St. Elmo reflects popular trends and styles from the 1880s to the 1920s. Primarily a middle income neighborhood, the architecture reflects more vernacular trends than explicit architectural styles, even though there are individually outstanding buildings in the district. As such, the buildings in the district present an overview of architectural trends during this period. The district includes much of the original town and thus contains a wide variety of structures such as churches, schools, commercial buildings, and residences ranging from simple shotgun structures to larger and more elaborate Victorian houses. The buildings of the St. Elmo Historic District are thus historical artifacts depicting the architectural development of a typical late nineteenth century residential town.

In summary, the history of the town of St. Elmo is closely interwoven with that of Chattanooga. A streetcar suburb, and yet an independent town, St. Elmo is important in Chattanooga's history of urban development and community planning. Reflecting many typical development patterns of a small town, St. Elmo's history is an example of the fate of many "satellite" communities absorbed by larger cities. Also, St. Elmo's historical charm as the site of a major nineteenth century novel is enhanced by its distinctive architectural development. Within the district exists a varied collection of middle-income, vernacular Victorian housing and Bungalows thus well representing how architectural styles popular among the more affluent during the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries were adapted and interpreted by the middle and lower income working classes. In addition to these adaptations and interpretations, the district contains excellent examples of styles as developed expressly to meet the demand for low-cost but architecturally fashionable housing among the growing middle-income classes. A combination of various examples of vernacular trends as well as more elaborate and artistic styles, St. Elmo is an excellent representative example of architectural trends from the 1880s through the 1920s.

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BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION

The town limits of St. Elmo before its annexation were largely defined by tradition and geographical boundaries. As discussed in the architectural statement, the northern boudary was defined by the Broad Street - Cummings Highway area, the western boundary by the slopes of Lookout Mountain, the southern boundary by the Tennessee-Georgia state line, and the eastern boundary by an undeveloped ridge. From within these boundaries a district was selected which contains the major residential portion of the town. The district centers around the main thoroughfares of the town, the Georgia Road (St. Elmo Avenue) and Blowing Springs Road (Tennessee Avenue). With these roads (or streets) as the core of the district, boundaries were drawn to include historically significant properties and to retain the architectural integrity and cohesiveness of the area.

It is the clearly perceived and easily recognized historical boundaries of St. Elmo that sets St. Elmo apart from many other neighborhoods and areas in Chattanooga. These boundaries are widely recognized and provide a distinct feeling of place for St. Elmo. Even though absorbed or annexed by the City of Chattanooga, residents of St. Elmo still perceive a strong feeling of community and place due to the strong community ties and associations.

JUSTIFICATION FOR INCLUDING FOREST HILLS CEMETERY

Although cemeteries are not normally listed in the National Register, Forest Hills Cemetery was included due to its historical associations with A.M. Johnson and the development of the town of St. Elmo as well as artistic merits.

Developed in the late 1870s by Colonel A. M. Johnson, the founder of St. Elmo, the cemetery quickly replaced the old Citizens Cemetery as the city's general cemetery. Over the following years, members of many of Chattanooga's most well known families were buried at Forest Hills. Located adjacent to land which Mrs. Thankful Johnson had inherited from her father, James A. Whiteside, the cemetery's prestige grew as St. Elmo's popularity and accessibility increased. Thus, the history of the two are closely interwoven.

Artistically, the cemetery contains some outstanding examples of stone work depicting traditional funereal motifs. These motifs encompass a broad range of meanings; angels, anvil, trees, cut trees, unfinished stonework, lambs, draped monuments, palm leaves, and doves. Since the Forest Hills Cemetery was so widely used, this collection is an excellent overview of various popular tastes and trends in tombstone architecture dating from the 1880s until the present.

Other Buildings in the District

There are a total of 94 other buildings in the district. Of the total 754 properties in the district, these buildings comprise only 12% of the sites. Scattered throughout the district, these buildings are primarily residential in nature. As are the contributing buildings, the more recently built structures tend to be one or two stories in height and are of frame construction. Due to the more recent construction dates or to the extensive alterations of some older buildings, these other buildings are considered non-contributing elements of the district.

There are 38 vacant lots in the district totalling 5% of the parcels.



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
