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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Colquitt Town Square Historic District encompasses the contiguous historic commercial downtown of Colquitt. The district is located on a very low rise of ground at the center of Colquitt's square city limits. Principal streets intersect at right angles in this area, creating a modest gridiron pattern of a few blocks arranged around the central courthouse square. The blocks are generally subdivided into long, narrow lots fronting on to the main streets and backing up to alleys or service areas. Buildings on these lots are predominantly one story masonry commercial structures dating from the early 20th centry; a few two-story structures are also present. These buildings border three sides of the courthouse square and share both party walls and a common setback from the sidewalks. The fourth (south) side of the square contains freestanding structures and vacant lots. Styles of architecture represented in the district are limited to Victorian Eclectic and Commercial. Brick, the principal building material, is used structurally and decoratively in foundations, piers, load-bearing walls, pilasters, spandrel panels, parapets, segmental arches, string courses, and corbelled cornices. It is complemented by concrete block in load-bearing walls, cast-iron columns in storefronts, and stone, pressed metal, and wood detailing. Some building interiors still retain their historic wood, plaster, and pressed metal finishes. In the center of the district, on a historic lanscaped square, stands a contemporary courthouse built after fire destroyed its predecessor in the 1970's. Non-historic commercial properties that do not contribute to the character and appearance of the district are limited to a few mid 20th century structures. Landscaping in the district is confined to the historic courthouse square.

Boundaries for the Colquitte Town Square Historice District circumscribe the intact historic commercial area in downtown Colquitt. Non-historic commercial buildings and 20th century residential: development surround the district.

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An area around the courthouse square, including properties facing all four sides of the square and properties northeast and northwest of the square, along Cuthbert Street, First Street, College Street, and Main Street.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Colquitt Town Square Historic District is historically significant in the areas of architecture and commerce. In terms of architecture, the district is significant for its fine collection of modest, small-town, early 20th century commercial buildings. These buildings, built after a disastrous fire in 1902 which literally destroyed downtown Colquitt, reflect the prevailing design principles and construction practices of commercial architecture at this time as they were applied in small southwest Georgia cities. Local interpretations of Victorian Eclectic and Commercial styles of architecture are well represented. Period details including piers, pilasters, columns, spandrel and parapet panels, segmental arches, string courses, and corbelled cornices are apparent throughout. The use of brick, both structurally and decoratively, in conjunction with cast iron, pressed metal, wood, and concrete block, is characteristic of early 20th century commercial architecture in Georgia. In addition to these architectural qualities, the district is also significant architecturally because of its concentration of historic commercial buildings arranged around the courthouse square which creates a distinct downtown environment in this part of Colquitt. This effect is enhanced by the relatively uniform scale and massing of the buildings, the consistent use of materials, compatible ornamentation, and the regular siting of buildings around three sides of the courthouse square. In terms of commerce, the district is significant because of its layout and its role as the principal commercial center for Colquitt and Miller County. The district has a gridded street plan that has been identified as characteristic of small Georgia cities founded and developed for commercial as well as civic purposes. The district served as the center for day-to-day commercial activities in the city and its surrounding agricultural countryside; these commercial activities included wholesaling and retailing, banking, professional services, hotel accommodations, and entertainment. Accommodation to the automobile is reflected by the district's two early 20th century gas stations.


