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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Ada Durrell House is located on the northeast corner of the intersection of Broad and Mason Streets in Bethel, Maine, opposite the Bethel Common. The house faces west, fronting on Broad Street. There is a large bagh behind it. The house was built in 1813-15 by Dr. Moses Mason, a local physician.

The wooden frame house is two-and-a-half stories high with a gable roof and two interior chimneys. A one-and-a-half story lean-to was added across the rear at a later date. The exterior is clapboarded. The Mason House was the first house in Bethel to be painted white, and it remains white today.

Except for the substitution of four-light windows for the original ones, the exterior of the Mason House looks today as it did originally. The central doorway is framed by tall pilasters. The door is sidelighted and has an elliptical fanlight over it. There are two windows to either side of the doorway and five windows across the second floor. The window architraves project slightly from the clapboards.

The interior of the Mason House has been modernized, but the outstanding wall murals of the main hall and stairway remain in excellent condition. The work of Rufus Porter and/or his apprentices, they depict rural and harbor scenes, and are typical of Porter's subject matter and painting methods. The arrangement of the trees is quite similar to a mural painted by Porter in the Old Barrows Homestead in Fryeburg, Maine, c. 1830. Probably the Mason House murals were painted during this period.

The house contains much gracefully ornamented interior woodwork. The main hall has a molding band of delicate vertical relief separating the murals from the lower wall surface. The dining room and an upstairs bedroom have wainscoting. The dentil molding of the dining room wainscoting matches the molding used in the handsome classical mantlepiece in that room. (The house has been well maintained.

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Rufus Porter (1792-1881) was an important early American painter. He popularized the use of local scenes and scenery in large scale painting. He was the first painter to use stenciling and stamping, methods previously used for furniture decoration, in landscape painting. Porter had a distinctive style. He used large elms and stylized shrubs in the foreground of his work, he shaded the sides of trees and buildings heavily, he repeated variations of Portland harbor, orchard, and farm scenes. The murals in the Dr. Moses Mason House are an excellent example of the work done by Porter and his small school of pupils. VRufus Porter was also an active inventor and the founder of the <u>Scientific American</u>.

The Dr. Moses Mason House is important itself. A handsome Federal house, essentially unchanged on the exterior, it one of many old homes which surround the Bethel Common, giving the town a picturesque and distinguishing unity. The Bethel Inn and Bethel Library also face the common. The Bethel Historical Society intends to use the Mason House as a meeting place and museum.

Dr. Moses Mason (1789-1866) was a leading figure in Bethel. He gained his medical education by apprenticeship to a local doctor and started his own practice in 1813. In 1814 he was appointed Bethel's first postmaster; the post office was in the rear of his house. He was postmaster until 1834. He was commissioned a Justice of the Peace in 1821. Dr. Mason served as Representative to Congress from the Second District of Maine from 1833-37. Also a successful businessman, he built sawmills in Mason Town, a village later named for him. He was a Bethel Selectman for 14 years, and a Trustee of Gould Academy in Bethel from 1854 until his death. Dr. Mason is buried in Woodlawn Cemetery in Bethel.

Dr. and Mrs. Mason brought up Ada Twitchell, the daughter of cousins. The house was owned by her descendents until 1971, the last descendent being Ada Everett Durrell. (Elizabeth Mason Carter, who helped prepare this form, is the greatgranddaughter of Dr. Moses Mason's brother, Ayres Mason.)
