The Sanborn House, designed in 1907 in a Mannerist interpretation of the Beaux Arts style, occupies a hillside site overlooking the town center. An original carriage house stands behind the main house to the northwest.

The main house consists of a two story central block with a raised attic story and shallowly projecting frontispiece. A one story verandah projects from the south side while a one and one half story service wing is attached to the north. It is stuccoed, with heavily scaled detail executed in white painted wood. The ornament of the central block consists of two string courses beneath the second story windows, a dentiled entablature and a balustrade; that of the attic includes a plain entablature and a solid parapet; the porch has a plain entablature and a balustrade; the service wing has a dentiled frieze running through the second story windows and a solid parapet. The Mannerist influence can be seen in the antifixae-like elements which decorate the entablature, the use of keystones over rectangular openings and the misplaced frieze of the service wing.

The five bay facade is symmetrically organized around the frontispiece which is supported by two composite columns and two capped columns. It includes a center entry with a tall round arched stained glass window above which is framed by a molded architrave. This is flanked by narrow paired windows at the first story and double windows with panels beneath them at the second story. The south outer bay has double windows at both stories while the north bay has paired windows at the first story and a double window at the second. Secondary entries are located on the south elevation and in the service wing.

The carriage house consists of a two story rectangular block with flanking one story wings, like the main house it is stuccoed and trimmed with white painted wood. The symmetrical facade is organized around a two story arched opening which contains an overhead door with two 1/1 windows flanked by quarter round windows above. A single 1/1 window is located to right of the center arch at the first story while the left side is blank. Fenestration at the second story consists of a pair of windows on the right and three narrow windows on the left. Entries are located at each end of the building in wide pilasters which enframe the composition. Horizontal emphasis is provided by a frieze separating the stories and a wide entablature at the roof line. Each wing contains three windows.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Sanborn House (Aigremont) possesses integrity of location, design, setting, materials and workmanship and is significant both for its associations with the Sanborn family and for the quality of its architectural design. It was built between 1906-07 for Oren Cheney Sanborn, the son of James S. Sanborn, a founder of the Chase and Sanborn Co. in Boston. Although its architect is presently unknown, it stands as a locally unique intrepretation of the Beaux-Arts style and as one of the few houses — in the Boston area to exhibit mannerist characteristics. The house meets criteria B & C of the National Register of Historic Places.

Oren Sanborn, born in Maine in 1865, came to Winchester in 1901 at a time when the town was developing rapidly for the residence of Boston businessmen. Prospering as a member of his father's tea and coffee importing firm, Sanborn became one of the four wealthiest men in Winchester. He acquired two parcels of land to make up the nine-acre hillside tract with its magnificent view over Winchester Center to the Middlesex Fells. Although the architect is not known, Sanborn's house, which reportedly cost \$250,000 to construct, is by far the most impressive in the area.

In 1921 Sanborn was forced to sell the property. He had fallen upon hard times, and was living in Providence at the time. The new owner was a Bostonian, J. Edward Downes, founder of Downes Lumber Company, which was located in Boston. The condition of the house and grounds at the time of the sale required major repair work, and the Downes family of seven moved in around 1924. From 1925 until 1947, the house became a lively residence once again, housing another family prominent in Winchester society. Few changes appeared to the property except for the addition of a mother-in-law house constructed elsewhere on the land. (This house was later moved to a nearby street.) The main house and carriage house appear to have been relatively unaltered physically, and cared for properly by a staff of maids and gardeners.

In 1947 the house and land was sold to the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Boston and occupied by approximately twenty nuns. The nuns staffed a school built behind the house, known as Marycliff Academy. This plain cinder block school building, a non-contributing structure, was built in 1947, and functioned as a day school until 1970.



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
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

I have carefully reviewed your comments on the National Register nomination for the Sanborn House in Winchester, Massachusetts and will try to provide you with some of the background information which went into our decision making and its preparation. While this information played an important role in our assessment of the property's integrity and significance and remains an important part of the file, we did not feel that it was necessary or appropriate to include in the nomination form.

One area with which you have expressed concern is the extent of alterations to the house. This subject was not discussed in the detail you seek because no evidence was found to indicate major alterations had occurred. Neither a documentary study by a professional archivist nor a structural investigation by a competent historic architect pointed in such a direction.

Presumably you concern arises from the statement that major <u>repairs</u> occurred when the Downes family assumed ownership in 1924. This information was derived from an on site interview with Thomas Downes (son of J. Edward and Mary E.) who stated that a "general restoration" took place and that the exterior was "picked up." His recollection that this was in the nature of maintenance work is supported by tax valuation records of the period which do not show any increase. Unfortunately, no more concrete evidence such as plans or historic photographs have been found.

Physical investigation also supports the position that the house appears substantially as it did at the time of its construction in 1907. First, the plan makes it unlikely that either the third story or service wing were added.

The wing contains kitchen and laundry facilities as well as servants quarters which were obviously necessary to the functioning of the house; the third floor contains secondary bedrooms. Further, details such as doors and architraves, built in storage facilities and bathroom fixtures are consistent throughout.

Just as the form of the house appears to be original, so do individual features such as windows and doors. Sash is consistently deployed throughout the house: single pane casements in the main block and 2/2 double hung in the ancillary wing and third story. Not only do these unbroken glass surfaces complement the tautness and clarity of the Beaux-Arts composition (as multi-pane casements complement the complexity of contemporary medieval revivals) but they also appear in similar houses of the period such as the Joseph Remick House at 84 Cambridge Street (slides enclosed). The entry has been altered to the extent that the door itself is new (c. 1972-original glazed two-leaf door stored in carriage house) and the two outer column capitals are capped as noted in the nomination form. The elongated arch over the door contains original, period stained glass and its shape is typical of windows which light stair landings for that period, although its placement over the door rather than to one side is somewhat unusual.

Another area of concern appears to be with the stylistic derivations of the house. While your questions about the Beaux-Arts style and mannerist influences are certainly valid in terms of art historical inquiry, I believe that they are somewhat beyond the scope of an individual National Register nomination. In Section 7, we noted specific features which we felt could be identified with a Mannerist interpretation and in Section 8, we noted that this treatment was unusual for a residence in the area. These observations were based on both the bulding specific surveys conducted on a community level and on the regional reconnaissance level survey conducted by our interdisciplinary state survey team. Neither of these considered the specific issue of mannerism in enough detail to allow us to be more specific, especially since an architect has not been identified.

The final area concerns inclusion of the 1947 Marycliff Academy. Although non-contributing, this structure stands on the original 9 1/4 acre parcel and is part of the present parcel owned by the town. Enclosed you will find a slide of the building; if you feel that it should be deleted from the nomination, we will be happy to comply.
