The Hill Complex Historic District includes four contributing properties and one non-contributing property fronting on York Street (S. C. Highway 49) and Shannon Street in downtown Sharon. The district consists of properties which are related to the W. L. Hill cotton and mercantile business, including the Hill house.

- 1. W. L. Hill Store (1913), 3034 York Street: This imposing four-level brick building was listed individually in the National Register of Historic Places on January 20, 1995.
- 2. William L. Hill House (ca. 1890), Shannon Street: This house was built for William Lawrence Hill several years after his marriage, and is located across Shannon Street from the Hill Store. The one-story frame cottage features frame siding on the lower wall surfaces and imbricated shingles in the gables and as a frieze. The roof is cross-gable in form, with the cross gables having small tripartite windows and jerkinhead roofs. A metal shingle roof covers most of the house, which shows elements of Queen Anne style. Windows throughout contain four-over-four light, double-hung sash.
- 3. W. L. Hill Cotton Gin (ca. 1925), 3294 York Street: This building replaced the first gin which was destroyed by fire. The end walls are essentially brick firewalls, laid in American bond, while the side walls are sheathed with corrugated metal. The roof structure is frame with exposed rafter tails, is sheathed in metal, and is pierced only by two cone-capped cylindrical roof ventilators. The roof conforms to the low pitch of the brick end walls that feature a coping of brick corbels. The south side features a large shed extension which accommodated wagons for unloading cotton. The shed is of post construction, with an outer wall sheathed in metal and pierced by window openings. The east end wall has a large cargo bay with segmental arched lintel. The west end wall has no openings.
- **4. W. L. Hill Cotton Warehouse and Dock (ca. 1920), York Street**: This warehouse was built along the railroad for the loading and unloading of cotton and merchandise for the Hill Store. It featured a rail siding with a dock. The one-story brick building has a flat roof with a stepped parapet on the east end. The south side has two sets of double doors within segmental arched openings. A large central opening appears to be modern. The windows have been partially boarded.
- 5. Nonnie's Kitchen and Donna's Discount, 3040 York Street, corner of York and Shannon Streets, Noncontributing: post-1960 masonry building.

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The Hill Complex Historic District includes an important collection of commercial, industrial, and residential buildings which represent the development of a business complex in the town of Sharon by William Lawrence Hill. The district is an attempt to more fully interpret the broad context of the development of Hill's business interests by including other commercial buildings and his home, which are all in close proximity to the W.L. Hill Store, individually listed in the National Register in 1995. During the last decade of the nineteenth century and for the first half of the twentieth century, Hill developed a number of interconnected businesses which served western York County.

The properties listed in this district, taken as a whole, possess historical integrity and provide an important record of the development of commerce and industry in the community. The district meets National Register Criterion A because the properties illustrate a broad pattern of development during the early history of the community of Sharon. It meets Criterion C because many of the buildings have significance as a collection of early twentieth century commercial and residential structures typical of small towns in the South Carolina Piedmont. The resources related to the storage and processing of cotton are also significant, and represent types of buildings which have often been lost in similar towns.

The town of Sharon had its beginnings with the arrival of a rail line in western York County in 1888. The rail line, known as the Three C's (Charleston, Cincinnati, and Chicago), helped to create or enhance a number of communities in the South Carolina Piedmont. A depot was built at the site of Sharon, in close proximity to existing roads, and a village began to develop. It was named for Sharon Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church, which was located nearby and had been established in 1796. Sharon was incorporated in 1889. The Town developed on land owned by the Gilfillin and Rainey families, and J. L. Rainey donated the lot for the train depot. Houses and stores began to be built along the Chesterville-Shelbyville Road, which followed the route of the present S. C. Highway 49 into town from the south and passed out of town on the present Woodlawn Street. The area around the intersection of this road with the York Road began to develop as a commercial center. By the early 1900s, brick store buildings were being constructed, many of which remain today and comprise a large part of the District. The most impressive is the W. L. Hill Store, built in 1913 to contain a general merchandise business and the Planters Bank.

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The <u>Yorkville Enquirer</u> called Sharon an "Embryo City" in 1889 and predicted that it would grow as large as York.<sup>5</sup> Although it served as a depot and trading site for the surrounding countryside, the village of Sharon never achieved significant growth. The nearby City of York to the east had the advantage of a more strategic location and the presence of the County Courthouse. One writer described the failure of many early merchants and theorized that they lacked both experience and capital.<sup>6</sup> Sharon failed to attract a textile mill, which was an industry which often served to enhance the growth of small towns. Typical businesses in the early period of Sharon's development included the sale of dry goods, groceries, general merchandise, furniture, and drugs.<sup>7</sup> The Sharon Downtown Historic District, located to the west of the Hill Complex, includes a collection of one and two-story commercial buildings which illustrate the development of the downtown commercial core of a small Piedmont town. It was listed in the National Register of Historic Places on November 2, 2001.

William Lawrence Hill (1866-1953) entered the retailing business in 1888. During his business career which spanned over sixty years, he developed a business that included land ownership, cotton farming and ginning operations, banking, and retailing. The Hill Complex Historic District reflects all of those interests. The W.L. Hill Store, built in 1913, was constructed on a grand scale and is still by far the largest building in the town of Sharon. The first floor included dry goods, feed and seed items, groceries, meat, and shoes. Hardware and farm implements shared the second floor with the ladies department. Buggies and wagons could be purchased on the third floor. The store also was an authorized automobile dealer, selling Chevrolets and later Fords. The building also housed the Planters Bank, with Hill as President. The bank occupied the rear section of the first floor.

Hill gradually developed other buildings which served his business interests. About 1920, he erected a cotton warehouse adjacent to the store and a warehouse across the street which had access to the rail line. These warehouse buildings served to hold his cotton crop and cotton belonging to other farmers. They also served to house merchandise for his store which was delivered in quantity by rail. Hill was able to buy in large quantities at lower prices and maintain a full inventory. Through these practices, he was able to attract customers from a wide territory. This was necessary, since the population of Sharon has always been small. Hill also had a cotton gin within the complex. The present gin was built ca. 1925 to replace an earlier gin which was destroyed by fire. With the presence of the railroad, Sharon became a location where Hill could receive cotton from his own farms and the surrounding farmers, store it, process it at gins, and ship it to markets on the rails. The Hill home is located across Shannon Street from the store, was built ca. 1890, shortly after he went into the mercantile business. The Hill Complex Historic District is an unusual collection of buildings associated with a small town merchant.
