

Built in 1917 by the Champion Bridge Company of Wilmington, Ohio, the Surprise Truss Bridge crosses Sewee Creek, one of the major secondary streams of northern Meigs County. The bridge is located in the small ghost community of Surprise, once an important commercial center with a mill and stores. The Meigs County Court Minute Books(Volumes 11-13) show that at least three wooden bridges stood at Surprise before the present steel truss bridge was built in 1917. The wooden bridges at Surprise were repaired twice and replaced twice between 1897 and 1917, when the Surprise Truss Bridge was built. The truss bridge was in use until 1981, when a new concrete bridge was built. The Surprise Truss Bridge, with its increased load-bearing capacity and longer life, was essential to the shift in Meigs County toward motorized overland transport.

Verbal Boundary Description and Justification:

7. The boundaries include the bridge, which is 98' x 12' in length, located on Sewee Creek on the Ten Mile-Sweetwater Road.
