#### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Situated northwest of Stillwater, one mile east of Lake Carl Blackwell, the Cottonwood Community Center is a one-story rectangular building constructed of hand-cut cottonwood. Twenty feet wide by forty-three feet long, it has four long narrow sash windows on the east and west sides and an exterior door on the south wall. The north wall has an added enclosed lean-to with an exterior door and one small sash window on the east and west walls. The building is exclusive of any trim and is classified as a clapboard structure with a one gable roof spanning from south to north.

The interior has its original wall material but the walls have been paneled over. A few original benches exist and the wooden floor is intact. During World War II, the interior was partitioned into two rooms for school purposes and an enclosed lean-to was added. The partition was removed about 1957.

The exterior has been altered by new roof shingles, metal grates on the windows, and fairly new (the last 20 years) clapboard siding added over the original siding.

Exterior structures include two outside toilets dating back to the early 1900s. These are located 20 feet north of the main building. is also playground equipment on the east side of the building consisting of a merry-go-round, swings, a slide, and high bars.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Cottonwood Community Center, built about 1889, is significant for its historic associations with the development of Stillwater's rural agricultural community. The Center is indicative of school house architecture that was popular in the late 1800s and early 1900s in the Stillwater community. Of the four remaining one-room school structures in the Stillwater area, only Cottonwood has been in continuous use from the time it was built to the present. It has been, and continues to be, an important focus of life for the rural community west of the town.

The Cottonwood Community Center was originally built as a school by local homesteaders on the property of Jesse Pierce. It was named Cottonwood because there was an abundance of cottonwood from which the Center was constructed. It was used as a school during the week and as a church on weekends by the local residents, including the Swarts, Meeks, Sharps, Hasketts, Huffs, Randolfs, Harringtons and Paynes, all important families in the area's early history.

In 1907 the Pierce family decreed that if Cottonwood was not used as a school, the building must be off their land or torn down. The residents raised \$400 to be used in moving Cottonwood from the west side of the section line to the east side. The Swarts sold them one acre (\$50) for the new location. The building is now used for community functions, fund raisings for the building, and social gatherings. The building itself belongs to the School District of Stillwater but the community residents do maintenance and repair. The land belongs to a corporation of community residents, and the building is still considered by them to be an important locus of community life.


