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The New Sweden School is a one-story common-bond brick building with a raised concrete basement story. The building has a hipped roof. The front exposure, facing east onto New Sweden School Road, has five bays. The central bay is outset and serves as an entry bay giving access to the interior central hallway. Bays either side are created by banks of large double-hung sash windows (currently secured against damage with wood panels) and slightly outset brick columns or piers. Concrete bands at the tops of these piers are cast to resemble classical capitals. The raised basement story also has double-hung sash windows. The north and south exposures have two large window bays. The hipped roof is covered with wood shingles in deteriorated condition.

Colonial Revival features of the building include the brick columns or piers, large areas of inset brick suggesting panels at the building's corners and centered on the south and north exposures, a pedimented gable roof for the entry bay, stuccoed gable spaces with round vents suggestive of oxeye openings, and the building's overall symmetry. Above the main door is a concrete entablature with the legend "New Sweden School Dist No 27."

There are three alterations. A cupola-like bell tower has been removed from the roof of the building. The metal double doors at the entrance appear to date later than 1927. There is also a shed-roofed rear gymnasium addition, which is attached to the building at the central bay of the rear wall through an enclosed hallway. The addition is brick, and although the brick size and texture is distinct from that used in original portions of the building, its light pink color is similar.

The building retains its rural setting, surrounded by farmlands and farmsteads. Across Mill Road is the former community store, now used as a residence.

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The New Sweden School is architecturally significant as an excellent example of the multiple-classroom public schools built in Idaho to replace the earlier one-room schools. The building is also a good example of the Colonial Revival style used for some of these buildings. The building is historically significant for its association with the third phase (1920-1941) of community development in the Swedish-American communities of New Sweden and Riverview, in which those communities began to align themselves more closely with the Anglo-American culture of surrounding towns and communities. Symptomatic of the adjustments being made by the Swedish-American community are the building's mainstream style and fact that the building was designed by a regional architect. The building is also associated with an era of public schools development (1890-1930) in which Idaho communities had to accommodate a rapidly growing population at the same time that the rural economy was suffering from the effects of low agricultural prices and from the Great Depression.

The 1927 New Sweden School was preceded by at least three other buildings that had been used for school instruction. The first was located at the Charlie and John Peterson Farm. School was held there in a frame building from autumn 1895 to spring 1896. The second building used as a school in New Sweden was the Mission Covenant Church building, completed in the spring of 1896. The church was used for schooling until 1902, when a woodframe one-room school was built at the current school's location. By 1905 more room was needed, but the school was not added onto until 1907. In 1920 the New Sweden school board began discussions about building a new schoolhouse. Funding would not allow for a major construction project, but by 1926 approval was won for school bonds that would fund a \$25,000 building. The new building was put in service in 1927. It was used by the community until 1980, when the New Sweden school district was consolidated into School District 91. For a half century the school building provided a focus for the community, in addition to its important role as an educational facility.

The New Sweden School retains its integrity of location, design, setting, feeling, and association sufficient to represent historical developments in the New Sweden community. The building retains its architectural character sufficient to represent the styles, types, materials, and construction techniques from the period of significance. Integrity of materials and workmanship is good on the exterior of the building. Particular features that survive include exterior materials, massing, roof profile, fenestration, Colonial Revival style features (excepting the cupola), the building's rural setting at the intersection of two section-line roads, and its location on its parcel and orientation to the New Sweden School Road. The addition has a minimal impact upon the building's integrity because of its location at the rear, its minimal attachment to the building, and its relative size in relation to the building's bulk.
