The William Stearns Ranch is located east of Elk Mountain off Custer County Road 769. It occupies a grassy surface between a pine covered knoll and a rock canyon. The buildings are randomly arranged with the main house dominating the district.

List of Resources:

1. House: (Contributing), c. 1905; Oriented to the east, the house is a twostory, wood frame, rectangular pen dwelling with a one-story shed roofed entrance. Wall surfaces are covered with stucco. A gable roof with overhanging eaves is covered with wood shingles on the north slope, and with asphalt paper on the south slope. The shed roof is clad with wood boards and tin. The house rests on a concrete foundation. Fenestration is generally balanced from floor to floor and consists mostly of double-hung wood sash windows and a few smaller fixed-sash windows. The main entrance is located in the shed-roofed addition on the east. A secondary door is located between the two first floor windows, and opens to the living room on the south elevation.

The main block of the house displays a single-width double-pile configuration on both floors. The shed roof entrance area adds a small room at the front of the house on the first floor. Stairs leading to the second floor are located on the north side of the main block east room. On the main floor, the east room is the kitchen, and the west room is a living room. There are two bedrooms on the upper level.

The house and the root cellar are separated from the other buildings, including the privy, by a post and wire fence.

2. Barn: (Contributing), c. 1905 - 1920; The wood frame barn is clad with vertical boards and rests on a wood sill. It is capped by a shed roof covered with wood and asphalt paper.

3. Shed: (Contributing), c. 1905 - 1920; The first shed, a simple pen rectangular building, rises from a wood sill. While the bottom half of the shed is built of logs with saddle corner notching, the top half is of frame construction clad with vertical and horizontal boards. It is capped by a gable roof also covered with wood boards.

4. Root Cellar: (Contributing), c. 1905 - 1920; The root cellar is a simple dugout with a wooden door.

5. Privy: (Contributing), c. 1905 - 1920; The privy is a rectangular pen building that rises from a wood sill and is covered with a shed roof of horizontal board construction.

6. Shed: (Contributing), c. 1905 - 1920; The second shed is a wood frame structure that rises from a wood sill and is capped by a shed roof.

7, 8, and 9. Attached Sheds: (Contributing), c. 1905 - 1920; The attached group of three sheds feature wood and rock combination sills, frame construction covered with wood boards and metal, and wood clad shed roofs.

10. Shed: (Contributing), c. 1905 - 1920; The third shed has a shape like a large privy but seems to have served as a storage facility. It rests on a wood sill, is covered in horizontal boards, and is capped by a tin-covered shed roof.

11. Garage: (Contributing), c. 1920; The garage was built at the end of the Stearns' ownership. The wood frame building rises from a wood sill and is capped by a tin-covered gable roof.

The district has witnessed little change in recent times.

Site Plan (Complete Inventory of Structures and Features) with North Arrow






Under Criterion A of the National Register Criteria, the William Stearns Ranch is significant in the area of Exploration/Settlement, because it represents the development of the legal homestead rancher in the southwestern corner of Custer County, South Dakota. In particular, this ranch represents one of the earliest methods of land acquisition known as "squatting." Homestead ranchers were the first generation of settlers to make good and to continue to live on a homestead claim in this semiarid part of Custer County. The homestead rancher who lived on his/her property, as did the Stearns family, represents a shift from the owners and workers of large cattle companies of the open range period who frequently lived in town.

Under the South Dakota State Historical Preservation Plan the nominated property relates to the historic contexts labeled: IV. Permanent Rural and Urban Settlement, A. Claim Era; and IV. C. Permanent Farm and Ranch Development. This property relates to the local historic context and property type labeled: "Ranches of Southwestern Custer County, South Dakota."

The Stearns Ranch was established in circa 1905 by William Stearns who came to South Dakota from Chadron, Nebraska, to raise Percheron (work) horses. Stearns had already used his homesteading rights in Nebraska, so he "squatted" on the ranch in Custer County. "Squatting" is living on a parcel of land without filing a claim. The house was clearly intended to be a permanent home, and the family lived there until 1920 when the Federal Government removed them. At the time Stearns first settled in Custer County, squatting was not unusual. However, by 1920, the Homestead Acts had been amended making ranching and horse raising more feasible, and squatting was no longer tolerated.

Fred Hines received a patent to the land in 1925, but he did not live there long and does not seem to have been a rancher. In 1934, the property was sold to Bert Tony, who was an immigrant rancher from Switzerland. Ten years later, Tony sold the property to Arthur Montgomery. About 1951, the Montgomerys sold the property to Beverly (male) and Geraldine Woodford, who in 1953 sold it to Harold and Loretta Mahnke. The Mahnke family did not live at the ranch but used it only to winter cattle. Vernon Simmons bought the property in 1963. Simmons used this land as extra range for cattle, and occasionally stayed at the ranch.

The period of significance of the nominated property extends from its date of founding and construction of the oldest extant contributing resources in 1905 to 1920, when the Stearns family vacated the ranch.

GEOGRAPHICAL DATA

ACREAGE OF NOMINATED PROPERTY: 3.5 acres.

VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION: The nominated property is bounded by a set of imaginary lines that intersect to form a rectangle around the ranch district. The northern boundary line lies 20 meters north of the northernmost wall of the Barn (resource # 2) and runs parallel to that wall. The eastern boundary line lies 60 meters east of the easternmost wall of the Barn and runs parallel to that wall. The southern boundary line lies 40 meters south of the southernmost wall of the House (resource # 1) and runs parallel to that wall. The western boundary line lies 30 meters west of the westernmost wall of the House and runs parallel to that wall. The ranch is located in the Northeast Quarter of the Southwest Quarter of the Southwest Quarter of Section 27, Township 4 South, Range 1 East, (Black Hills Meridian) in Custer County, South Dakota.

BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION: The boundary lines of the nominated property are set to include all features of the ranch complex, but to exclude pasture land and any public roadways.
