7. Description

Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Hotel Thompson is situated on the northwest corner of Third Avenue and Tenth Street in Worthington, Minnesota. Designed by architect W. E. E. Greene, the building features elements of the Georgian Revival style. The three storey brick structure measures 118 feet along Tenth Street and 140 feet along Third Avenue. At the time of its opening in March, 1912, the hotel featured 75 guest rooms, a dining room considered the finest in the southwestern portion of the state, and space for several commercial tenants, including a moving picture theatre.

The visual effect of the hotel's primary facade is of two individual buildings joined by a one storey portico featuring a pedimented gable. The entry is separated into three areas by metal columns on glazed brick piers. Outer sections lead to commercial shops located below grade. The center portion, one-half level above grade, leads to the hotel lobby and adjacent shops accessible from the entry landing through private entrances. Above the center entry the actual U shape of the building creates light and air circulation for hotel facilities. The facade terminates in paired low gable pediments with oculus windows and dentilated metal cornice.

Windows are rectangular, double hung sash set into wooden frames. Shaped lintels executed in tan colored brick are flush with the wall surface.

The ground floor level has been altered over the years to accommodate commercial tenants. A secondary entrance located on the east facade has retained the original stamped metal ceiling.

The hotel lobby interior is substantially intact, retaining original architectural features including an elaborate pressed metal ceiling, oak millwork and wainscoating, ceramic tile flooring and a portion of the original lobby counter.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Hotel Thompson is significant as a testimonial to the commercial confidence and economic potential which Worthington entrepreneur Peter Thompson visualized for this small town in southwestern Minnesota. It was Thompson's energy and faith in the town's future which encouraged him, at the age of seventy-one, to begin construction on what remains the largest commercial structure in the town. From its opening in March, 1912, until it closed in 1975, it enjoyed the reputation as one of the largest and finest hotels in the southwestern portion of the state.

Peter Thompson arrived in Worthington, in 1871, purchasing the first three lots in the newly surveyed town. The following year he built the city's first commercial building. From that time, until his death in 1927, Thompson was active in numerous business enterprises including mercantile, grain, agriculture machinery sales, banking, publishing and real estate. He founded the first title abstract office in Nobles County, preparing a set of abstract books in 1870 which he continued to update until he had the most elaborate set in the county. He established the Worthington Globe Printing office and was co-founder of the Nobles County Bank. He held numerous public offices including serving as the city's first treasurer and two terms on the city council. Thompson also helped establish the Swedish Lutheran Church where he served as deacon for over 40 years.

In 1910, Thompson responded to the community's need for a large hotel that would serve the needs of the town as well as the surrounding southwestern area of the state. Thompson obtained the services of W. E. E. Greene to draw plans for the hotel. Greene was an established architect and contractor in Luverne, Minnesota. A native of Huntingdon County, Pennsylvania, Greene arrived in Luverne in 1891 where he established a drafting and contracting firm. Many of Luverne's principal buildings including the Manitou Hotel, Carnegie Library and the county jail, as well as buildings located in Jackson, Minnesota, were executed under Greene's direction.

The Hotel Thompson opened on March 4, 1912. Total cost of construction approached \$80,000.00. At the time of the hotel's opening it featured 75 rooms with modern facilities, and included banquet and restaurant facilities, as well as space for several commercial businesses.
