Originally the connector between 2 large 3-story segments of a palatial house (over 100 ft. long "the ballroom" is a stucco structure whose front has a five-bay glass-filled arcade with flat panels set in the stucco wall above. The entrance hall has a groin vault ceiling, Renaissancestyle fireplace, and is floored with tiles from Henry Chapman Mercer's Moravian tile works, Doylestown, Pa. The building was built in 2 sections, the front entrance hall in 1910-11, and the ballroom itself in 1926-27. It faces a broad terrace leading down to the remnants of a large enclosed formal garden and pool, and beyond this a broad open cleared field, on upland approaches to Monadnock.

20. Significance

Like a Renaissance or 18th-century orangerie, this stucco-covered garden edifice (while an unusual building for New Hampshire) is part of the Dublin Italianate-Ren-PHOTO aissance Revival artistic heritage; and contains a whole room of Mercer tiles, by internationally famous potter and archaeologist Dr. Henry Chapman Mercer (1856-1930) Designed by two notable architects, it is a relic of the early 20th-century era of

History

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The remaining section of a palatial Italianate house built in 1910-11 by Louise, widow of William Amory of Boston. The entrance hall, facing the garden, is contemporary with the house and was designed by Charles Goodell of the Boston architectural firm of Parsons, Wait & Goodell. The ballroom itself, added in 1926-27, was designed by the important ecclesiastical architect Harry Little (Little & Robb, Boston, see #151). This is the remnant of the second and much more ambitious of two large dwellings built by Mrs. Amory (see also Auchincloss house, #148), and served as the focal point of her extensive farm-estate until shortly after World War II, when the major portions were torn down. At one time (early 1930's) known as "Trinity Hall", it was used as a vacation retreat by Trinity Church in Boston.
