STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE:

after \$1800 in gold that Ward had received from the sale of cotton shipped hanged by Sherman's troops when they invaded Enterprise. The soldiers were district of South Carolina (Camden). They settled north of Enterprise on W. A. and Laura L. Ward moved to Clarke County in 1846 from the Kershaw prise invasion. down the Chickasawhay River to Mobile, Alabama, sometime before the Enterhome was built. W. A. Ward became a very successful planter and was almost an 800-acre tract on the Chunky River and lived in a log cabin until their

presently under restoration. Ward house is attributed to its being one of two antebellum "coastal cottages by the Wards for over 125 years. The architectural significance of the development of Enterprise. The house and land have been owned continuously and the contributions made by the Ward family to the economic and social in the county, a vernacular house type with a double pitched roof.
