Narrative Description

The Jeppson/Reeder House, constructed c. 1895, is a brick, one-and-one-half-story, Victorian Eclectic crosswing type house with asphalt-shingle gabled roofs and a projecting wing at the north. The compact city lot features lawns and various mature deciduous trees and a rear yard enclosed by a wood fence.

The cross wing features a wrap-around porch, and all windows and doors are original.¹ The Victorian details are still intact. The gable end areas of the house are composed of a busy shingle pattern of diamond and fish-scale shapes, and a decorative wooden bracket is located at each cornice return. The two entrance doors at the facade are original with decorative panels and a carved wood trim surrounding the lights. The turned porch columns have fan-shaped brackets at the top.

The interior of the house has retained the original wall partitions as well as the Eastlake-style doors and windows. The doors have transom lights, and the windowsills are deep. A set of pocket doors, which once separated the parlor from the front room was moved to an open pantry area just behind the parlor. They cover up storage shelves.

About 1910, James M. Reeder added a one-and-one-half-story ell to the west of the home doubling the floor space. The walls and window sizes of this ell are remarkably similar to the original house. The soft composition bricks with lime and sand mortar, arched brick headers above the windows, and even the size of the window openings copy the original building.

The c. 1910 characteristics of the ell include a shallower pitch on the gabled roof with square butt shingles in the gabled end.² Also, the foundation of this addition is made of an early concrete that was poured in horizontal layers. A partial basement/storage area is located on the north side of the addition.

In 1962, the interior of this addition was remodeled. Birch plywood cupboards were installed in the large kitchen area, and the upstairs bedrooms and bathroom were upgraded. A sliding glass door was added at the west wall of the kitchen.³

Four frame outbuildings are grouped together in a backward L shape at the northwest part of the property: a c.1920s single-car garage, a small carport, a granary and a shed. None of the buildings are in good shape, and

the original roofs have been replaced with corrugated tin. The granary is the only building original to the property. It has been repaired extensively and only has about 40 percent of its original material.

The single-car garage came from the adjacent property on the north. It was moved onto the Reeder property about 1975.⁴ It is a simple drop siding frame building measuring 20 feet deep and 12 feet wide with a wooden garage door; the roof is gabled. The carport measures about eight feet square and borders the garage to the north and the granary to the west. Its roof is flat and overlaid with thin sheets of tin.

The granary also measures eight feet square and is lodged between the other three buildings so that its south side is the only elevation exposed. It is taller than the other structures, and its gable ends are visible. Over half of the original plank siding has been replaced with scraps of plywood.

The shed measuring 16 $\frac{1}{2}$ feet long is the westernmost structure and is directly behind the granary. Its south side is missing and has chicken wire stretched across it. It was moved onto the property around 1950.⁵

Narrative Statement of Significance

The Jeppson/Reeder House, built c. 1895 with a c. 1910 addition, is significant under Criteria A and C. It is historically significant under Criterion A for its association with the early history of Brigham City, particularly the transition from a communitarian economy to private enterprise. It is architecturally significant under Criterion C as one of a few⁶ Victorian-style cross-wing-type houses that has retained its architectural integrity. The Jeppson/Reeder House is being nominated under the "Economic Development of Brigham City and Residential Architecture, 1854-1950" context of the Historic Resources of Brigham City multiple property nomination.

History of Brigham City

The Mormons were forced to leave Nauvoo, Illinois, in 1846, because of religious persecution. They found a new place to live in the Great Basin area of the West.⁷ Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (LDS or Mormon Church) President and territorial leader Brigham Young directed rapid expansion of the Great Basin. In 1853, he asked Apostle Lorenzo Snow to take 50 families with him to colonize Brigham City as the northernmost community. Young advised Snow to establish an economy where the people could produce all their commodities, so Snow carefully selected settlers with various trade skills.⁸

Snow had the town plat surveyed in 1856⁹ and provided property for residents to build homes and farms. He supervised the construction of public buildings and encouraged people to form private businesses. In 1865, he began changing the town's economy. He asked local merchants to combine their businesses to form a corporation. This was called the Brigham City Mercantile and Manufacturing Association, or Co-op. Stock in the Co-op was available to all residents for \$5 a share or equivalent labor. Between 1866 and 1875 five local factories were built which produced necessities for all townspeople. This communitarian economy ran successfully for 15 years. Its demise began with a series of financial disasters in the late 1870s.¹⁰ Consequently,

Snow sanctioned the return of privately owned businesses. By 1892, stores along Main Street included a bank, a bakery, two hotels, tailor shops, meat markets, drug stores, lumberyards, harness shops, blacksmith shops, furniture stores, and a photography gallery.¹¹

Farming was the major occupation during and after the Co-op. Forty-four percent of the workforce in the city grew crops or raised animals as their main source of income.¹² Some of the early businessmen catered to the agricultural and fruit-growing needs. Others made a living as attorneys, insurance agents, doctors, dentists, teachers, merchants and midwifes. In addition, seven percent of the city's workers were employed in the building trade. The 1900 census shows 21 carpenters, 10 painters, 8 saw millers, 7 mason workers, 3 marble cutters, 2 tinners and 2 bricklayers.¹³

History of Homeowners

Albert Jeppson had a thriving stonework and monument business in Brigham City with partner H. Jensen.¹⁴ Albert was born in Brigham City on December 27, 1867, to Jeppa and Gunnell Hansen Jeppson. Both his parents were among the first 50 families chosen by Lorenzo Snow to settle the city. It was said of his father Jeppa that he was one of the few men that Lorenzo would trust with his life.¹⁵

Albert bought the property, one and one-quarter acres of orchard, from his father Jeppa in 1889.¹⁶ At this time Albert was twenty-two years old and single. In January 1894, he married Mary Adeline Thompson in the Logan Temple. Their first child, a girl, was born in October 1894, and their second child, a son, was born in November 1896. It is estimated the house was built sometime between 1894 and 1896. The couple eventually had seven children.

Albert and Mary decided to become farmers and homesteaded land in the Idaho Falls, Idaho, vicinity. They sold this home in November 1901 to Elizabeth and George Higley and moved in December 1901, to Iona, Idaho, where they spent the rest of their lives.¹⁷

Elizabeth and George Higley were early Mormon immigrants to Utah. George was born in Nauvoo, Illinois, in May 1845 and crossed the plains while an infant with one of the first companies. His family settled in Provo, Utah, where he was raised and educated.¹⁸ Elizabeth was born in Wales in 1855 and immigrated with her family to Provo. The couple was married and made their first home in Tooele County. Later, they dry farmed in the western part of Box Elder County near Kelton.¹⁹

The Higleys moved to Brigham City in 1901 although Albert, at age fifty-six, continued to operate his dry farm near Kelton. They only lived in the house for one-and-one-half years and then moved to the northeast part of town. In April 1903 they sold the house to Joseph M. Reeder.²⁰

Joseph M. Reeder was born October 10, 1869, in Brigham City to George B. and Caroline Madsen Reeder.²¹ The George B. Reeder Family lived at about 150 North 200 West - only five blocks away from the house.²² When Joseph was twenty-nine he labored two years as a missionary in England and returned to Brigham City in 1900. Joseph was a farmer and owned land west of Brigham City where he raised a variety of irrigated crops, including alfalfa hay for cow feed.²³

Joseph was thirty-four and single when he purchased the home. Five years later he married Lula Burt, daughter of David P. and Hannah W. Wrighton Burt of Brigham City. Prior to her marriage, Lula attended business school after she graduated from High School and was employed at a local bank and at Stohl Furniture Company.²⁴

Joseph and Lula raised four sons and two daughters in the home.²⁵ About 1910 when their family was growing out of the original part of the house, Joseph added an ell to the rear of the home doubling the floor space. The brickwork on the addition was skillfully done and matches the brickwork of the original house.

Unfortunately, Joseph contracted typhoid and died on August 13, 1923, in the home. His brother Howard died of typhoid a week earlier.²⁶ After Joseph's death, Lula continued to raise the children in the home. She also took on heavier work responsibilities. First, Lula worked for S. Norman Lee Abstracting Company, then she was elected Treasurer of Brigham City serving four consecutive two-year terms. In 1940, she began working at the Box Elder County Recorder's Office and eventually retired as Deputy County Clerk in 1953, at 72. Lula was also a volunteer for her church and served in its women's organization (Relief Society). She also did much volunteer work in genealogy.²⁷

Lula deeded the property to her son Spencer in April 1953. At this time Spencer built a small frame home on the south part of the property for her to live in and moved his family into the historic brick home.²⁸ Lula died on January 16, 1962 at age 80.²⁹ Spencer worked for Hill Air Force Base and retired about 1970. He was also the custodian for the LDS Seventh Ward meetinghouse. After retirement, he worked odd jobs in Brigham City at Packer Motors and Bradshaw Auto Parts.

Spencer and his wife Verna lived in the house for 37 years. They raised five children in the home. The couple had married in May 1945 and she worked at Hill Air Force Base during World War II. She also worked at the Brigham City Library and in the school district's lunch program. Verna died of cancer in June 1990.³⁰ Two years after her death, Spencer married Ludene Young of Willard and they lived in her house. Spencer did not want to sell the home, so he left it unoccupied and occasionally rented it to family members for short periods of time.³¹ In the fall of 1997, Spencer's son Ross and his wife Ann moved into the home. They purchased it in 2000 and are living there today with their two children. Ross is the Director for the Salt Lake Convention and Visitor's Bureau.³²

Architecture

Victorian-era houses were designed asymmetrically and ornamentally. Variety abounded in the details of diverse courses of brick, wooden detailing around cornices, windows and porches. The style appeared on the

scene in Utah around 1885.³³ In Brigham City, the larger Victorian-style houses had the floor plan of a central block with projecting bays. These houses were built by prosperous families and are located near the center of town or on Main Street.

The smaller and more affordable Victorian Cottage usually had a cross-wing floor plan. An irregular balance was created with a projecting wing attached to a flanking wing. This was a change, but not a radical one, from the symmetrical balance of the hall and parlor floor plan of the earlier Utah houses. The cross-wings came in several footprints. The most common were the L and T shapes.³⁴

The Alfred Jeppson house is an L cross-wing which has the typical qualities of the Victorian Cottage. These features include a front porch with ornate columns and fancy carved entrance doors. The gable ends of the home have fancy brackets near the cornice returns with small decorative shingles composing the gable-end area. Throughout the State and in Brigham City, the cross-wing house became the most popular house type from the mid-1880s until roughly the turn of the twentieth century.³⁵
