DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

St. Mary's Church is constructed of rock-faced random ashlar limestone mined three miles to the north at the Druecker Stone Quarry. It is a simple Gothic Revival edifice with a gable roof, a center-front tower and a tall five-sided east apse flanked by one-story sacristies. Wall buttresses, corbelling, pointed-arch windows and corner parapets are the major design details. The buttresses and openings have been enriched by the addition of lighter Joliet marble trim. The tower features a rose window above the center entrance. An octagonal spire surmounts a cross-gable roof and both are decorated with metal finials. The three bells in the tower were purchased from a manufacturer in Cincinnati in 1875 and transferred from the old church. The tower clock was donated by the citizens of Port Washington and placed in operation in January, 1885.

The resplendent interior takes the form of a hall church and is enlivened by a full complement of stained glass windows in the form of double lancets decorated in non-representational designs. Pastel polychromy and gold leaf enhance the slender square piers and the vaulted ceiling, and is especially rich on the apse vault. A magnificently ornate high altar built by E. Hackner and Son of LaCrosse was added in 1912.

The church crowns the highest hill in Port Washington overlooking Lake Michigan and serves as the focal point for Port Washington's main street.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

8 SIGNIFICANCE

St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church is significant architecturally on a local level. When it was dedicated on October 9, 1884, it was hailed as "a splendid structure, an ornament not only to the city but the entire state."¹ More importantly, it is one of the major landmarks of Ozaukee County, owing its preeminence to its imposing site. In Port Washington it is rivalled only by the tall smokestacks of the electric company's generating plant.

In 1847 the first Mass held in Port Washington was read to three families in the home of Franz Gengler. By 1849 the congregation had increased to twenty families and they decided to build a church. Their selection of a site on the top of "Lighthouse Hill," which overlooked Lake Michigan and the community at the end of its main street, was most propitious. From that time to the present the site has been known as "Church Hill." The congregation erected a small frame church on land donated by Hiram Johnson, one of the first settlers in Ozaukee County. In 1860, the congregation had already outgrown their tiny church and they erected a larger, stone church. In 1881 the parish had grown to 250 families and another new church was required, Henry Messmer, an architect from Milwaukee, was commissioned to design the new stone structure.²

Although Port Washington is by no means a one-church town, St. Mary's has experienced a close relationship with the community which at least partially is a result of the physical dominance of the structure. In the 1870's the school of St. Mary's served as the district school in an unusual, and indeed illegal, situation in which it received state public school monies to operate. This occurred sporadically in Wisconsin communities, especially in those dominated by the Church. The practice at St. Mary's ended in 1884 when some local citizens objected. In 1885 the community donated a clock for the tower of the church, undoubtedly because it was the most easily seen spot in town.

But the influence of St. Mary's has extended far beyond the city limits. The church bells can be heard for miles around and the shining cross on the top of the church continues to serve as a beacon for sailors on Lake Michigan. Because of the simple beauty of its architecture and because of its prominent site, the church has served, ever since its dedication, when "many people from out of town... attended the solemn ceremony," as an unofficial pilgrimage shrine for tourists from all over the country.³
