

Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Beauregard Parish Jail is connected by tunnel to the adjacent parish courthouse. Both are located on a large courthouse green in the central business district of DeRidder. Although both buildings were completed in 1914, they are of completely divergent styles. The courthouse is opulently Beaux Arts, while the jail is constructed in a manner evocative of a sort of Gothic keep.

The four-story, concrete building has a grey stucco finish with exposed aggregate. The three-story central block has a central spiral staircase made of steel. Two-and-a-half-story wings which contain the cells protrude from all four sides of the central block. The central block is surmounted by a one-story ornamental tower. The building is entered via a wide porch which wraps around the front of one of the aforementioned wings.

The details, moldings, and trim are of concrete with a plain finish. Most are derived, albeit loosely, from the Gothic style. These features were uncommon in penal buildings of the period, though they often appear in collegiate buildings. They include:

- 1. the Tudor arches in the entrance porch and ornamental tower,
- 2. the hood molds over the windows and doors,
- 3. the false corner buttresses,
- 4. the mock crenelations surmounting the central block and the ornamental tower, (The multiple crenelations are placed at the centers rather than at the corners of the central block parapets.)
- 5. the bay window surmounting the main entrance, and
- 6. the gable parapets on the facade of each cell wing.

Some elements are not associated with the Gothic style. These include the arched dormers and the red tile roofs.

Each window is covered by a grid of steel bars, all of which appear to be original.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Criterion C

The Beauregard Parish Jail is significant in the area of architecture as a unique example of the use of Gothic architecture in a Louisiana parish prison. Indeed, it is undoubtedly the most elaborately styled parish prison in the state. Few prisons of the period received such elaborate architectural details, let alone a monumental central tower.* The jail was evidently designed as an ornament to the courthouse green. It stands today as a well-known lankmark both in the city and parish.

*This tower was used for hangings from time to time. Hangings were the legal method of execution in Louisiana until 1941 and were carried out by local authorities.
