DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Located at 234 East Fulton Street in Canton, Mississippi, the Old Madison County Jail is a two-story brick structure erected 1870-71. While the massive appearance of the entire building suggests strength, permanence, and security, the front (or north) section is decidedly less forbidding than the rear since the front section was planned to house the jailer and his family and as such offers an interesting architectural contrast to the ominous cell block behind. The residence is five bays wide by four bays deep, with walls laid in five-course common bond, with double string courses, a stuccoed water table, and a parapet to mask the low-pitched hip roof. The central-entrance double-leaf door on the north elevation is sheltered by a modern single-bay Colonial Revival porch and is flanked by double-hung two-over-two windows trimmed with stone lintels and sills. A one-story wing containing dining room, kitchen, and bath was added to the east elevation of the residence ca. 1900. Except for its all-stretcher veneer, the addition is carefully matched to the existing structure. Interior trim of the 1870-71 residence is quite simple and almost wholly intact. Door and window frames are unmolded with corner blocks, mantels are designed with chamfered pilasters supporting frieze and shelf, and the single-run staircase located in the center passage is fitted with unpretentious turned newel and balusters. There is no ornamental plasterwork. Doors have four ogee-molded panels except in the room that served as jailer's office and prisoner-receiving room, where ironsheathed doors are used. Clearly expressing its function, the cell block to the rear of the residence is designed with thick piers visually reinforced with quoins and corbel course, and barred windows placed high in each bay. The brick walls are laid in English bond for added strength. Access to the cell-block interior is through an iron-sheathed door leading from the jailer's office and then through double iron doors into a large bull pen. Originally, cave-like cells lined the east wall on both first and balcony levels. Three of these remain intact, the others having been removed to make way for larger, more efficient steel cages with a lever-locking system bearing a patent date of 1916. Originally the cell block was heated by a single wood-burning fireplace on the south wall of the bull pen. Later, heat was supplied by a stove, and later still by gas-fired heaters.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Old Madison County Jail, at 234 East Fulton Street in the county seat of Canton, Mississippi, is among the most outstanding and best preserved nineteenth-century penal facilities extant in Mississippi. In addition to the integral place it had in local government, the jail is significant as an example of post-Civil War architecture, exhibitin both domestic and institutional characteristics of the period. Middle-class taste in residential interiors of the 1870s is well reflected in the jailer's quarters, which occupy the front section of the building, while the cell block to the rear illustrates both the nineteenth-century concern for prisoner penance, in its solitary confinements, and later "improvements" to the penal system brought by twentieth-century technology in the form of machine-made and -operated steel cages installed ca. 1920. Present-day standards for prisoner confinement, which prompted the closing of the jail in 1969, represent a third phase of penal history coeval with the jail. The jail was constructed 1870-71 by Valentine Warner under the supervision of architect C. W. Oates at a cost of \$25,000 (Mrs. Sam Latimer, treasurer, Madison County Historical Society, interviewed by William C. Allen, architectural historian, at Canton, Miss., Nov. 14, 1978). None of the few changes the jail has undergone since its construction mars its overall architectural integrity. Ca. 1900 a wing containing a kitchen was added, presumably to replace an earlier detached kitchen, and the cell block was altered to accommodate steel cages ca. 1920. changes will remain as part of the overall interpretation of the site by the present owners, the Madison County Historical Society, which acquired the property in 1974. Restoration of the building is being planned.
