DESCRIPTION

The most impressive feature of the Dilworth House is the brickwork. The west gable wall is laid in Flemish bond with diapering. It features both a stepped belt course between the first and second floors and a band course at the eave line. The south frontage is laid entirely in Flemish bond with glazed headers. The rear wall and foundations are laid in English bond.

The house was built in two sections, each three bays wide with a central door; a seam in the brickwork of the south facade marks the division line between the east and west sections. The water table on the west portion is bevelled and stepped up at the entry; the east portion has a quarter-round water-table. Stretching across the facade is a belt course, two bricks wide, which is broken by the second-story windows.

Although the fenestration of the first floor is regular, the second story is marked by only three windows, asymetrically placed. The gable-end windows were added or enlarged after the house was built. All the original windows are surmounted by brick segmental arches.

To the east of the house are remains of an underground chamber possibly a root cellar. An arched opening, now sealed, is located S

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Dilworth House is a rare surviving specimen of an early Delaware yeoman's house. It features some of the finest diapered brickwork in Delaware.

In 1675, Edmund Cantwell surveyed for Patrick Carr a 200-acre tract between St. George's and St. Augustine creeks. In 1679, the tract passed to <u>Olla Jansen</u>, who probably built the west portion of the present house. The east portion probably was built early in the eighteenth century.

The farm passed through several hands until 1792, when it was bought by Robert Crow, who sold it to William Hill, who left it to his daughter Elizabeth, wife of John Alrichs Dilworth.

The farm later passed from John and Elizabeth Dilworth to John Ducha Dilworth, and then to a third John Dilworth.

This John Dilworth served in both houses of the Delaware legislature. In 1860, he turned the farm over to his brother, Thomas F. Dilworth, who added to the tract.
