

This house, while having been altered through the years, still retains a sufficient amount of its original fabric that it should be recognized and retained. We are therefore including it for its architectural significance, for its association with the exploration and settlement of the Bergen County area, and for its remaining historic fabric. As such, it is included in the Thematic Nomination to the National Register of Historic Places for the Early Stone Houses of Bergen County, New Jersey.

Local historian, Reginald McMahon says that the house was probably built about 1794, after David Van Gelder's marriage to Polly (Mary) Bogert. David was born in 1772 and raised in the house of his father Abraham around the corner to the west. David's son Abraham B. inherited the house in 1845 and lived there until 1876. His sister Pernelphe sold the house on April 18, 1884 to her nephew James R. Goetschius, who sold it on February 6, 1890 to Bruno Saalfeld, who transferred it to Otto Saalfeld in 1903. Otto sold, in 1903, to Lillie Mae Brown with four acres. Mary Ryan bought the property in 1923 and her husband sold it on March 19, 1935 to Frances R. Gini, who sold it on August 6, 1971 to the Marzoccas.
