DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Louis J. Moser Homestead is situated near Nevis, Minnesota, on a low peninsula which separates the east arm from the south arm of Mantrap Lake. The peninsula is designated "Louie's Point."

The structure is a one story vertical log building measuring 16 feet by 24 feet. A wood frame addition measuring 12 feet by 18 feet and a porch are attached to the log structure.

The log portion of the building was constructed of coniferous logs seven to ten inches in diameter. They were placed vertically. The base plate logs were hand hewn and notched for 6 inch floor joists placed approximately two feet apart. A sub floor of one inch boards was covered by four inch tongue and groove pine flooring. The roof of the log portion of the building was constructed of over-sized, rough cut joists spaced approximately two feet apart. They were covered by 1 inch by 12 inch planed pine boards and cedar shingles.

Various repairs were made to the building in 1928. A joist was inserted under the log floor. New cement chinking was placed between the logs. A concrete footing was laid around the building.

The log base plates and a number of the logs on the east and south sides of the building have deteriorated. The logs on the north and west sides are in good condition, with only minor deterioration at the base. Both the floor and the roof have sagged slightly. The roof is now covered with asphalt shingles.

The addition is "butted onto" the north exterior wall of the log structure. It is of standard frame construction and has been sheathed with asphalt composition siding. The roof is also of asphalt composition. An interior link between the log structure and the addition was provided by the removal of approximately four of the vertical logs. The date of the addition is not known.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Louis J. Moser was an early pioneer and resort owner in the area near Mantrap Lake in Hubbard County. His log home is significant as a surviving example of a homesteader's cabin and an early Minnesota resort. The vertical post and sill construction of the structure is unusual in the area.

Early maps and guest registers indicate that Moser's camp may have been one of the first fishing camps in this portion of Minnesota.



A structure which possesses great similarity to the Louis J. Moser Homestead Cabin near Nevis, Minnesota, is illustrated in Peter N. Moogk's publication Building A House In New France (pub. McClelland and Steward Limited, Canada - 1977). Moogk's illustration is that of a "piquet" hut found in French fishing settlements of Newfoundland and Cape Breton. Although this is not the "post-sur-sill" or "poteaux-sur-sole" construction found in the Moser Cabin, the similarities are none the less clearly evident. Moogk states that the "vertical fill consisted of round posts or 'piquets' that were chinked... and that 'piquets', whether framed or planted directly into the ground, were the hallmark of the French fishing communities on Newfoundland and Cape Breton."

In the case of the Moser Cabin, the round posts are placed directly on a sill rather than implanted into the ground; a feature which retards the rotting of the post bases, common to the "piquet" huts mentioned by Moogk. (Moogk's illustration shows a system of bracing applied at specified places along the length of the side-walls; this treatment is not found in the Moser Cabin. A xerox copy of the "piquet" hut as illustrated by Moogk is included with this nomination.)

Moogk places the dates of popularity of the "piquet" hut at the early eighteenth century, although it is certainly probable that the practice survived into the later part of that century. Moogk's dating of this building type indicates that the Moser Cabin represents an architectural style which was more than a century out of context at the time of construction.

In Minnesota there are basically two enclaves of vertical log construction. Both are tied to the French Canadians who settled in the Saint Croix River Valley and along the fur trade route from Grand Portage to Baudette, Minnesota. One vertical log structure is known to remain in the Saint Croix Valley; this structure is a curious composite of French and Scandinavian log construction techniques. There are five known vertical log structures in the Baudette area. None are known to have survived between Baudette and Grand Portage.


The Community of Nevis is approximately one hundred miles due west of Duluth and approximately one hundred miles due south of Lake of the Woods. Nevis is adjacent to the Crow Wing River (Au Riviére de Corbeau) which was a fur trade route, a fact which may explain the influence of early French log construction techniques. In that Louis Moser was of French-Canadian extraction, it is certainly possible that he knew of these techniques; the building, however, is out of context for its historical period, and as such it is an unusual resurrection of a "forgotten" log tradition.

The Louis J. Moser Homestead was locally known as Louie's Camp. Research undertaken by the Hubbard County Historical Society indicates that the camp was one of the first fishing camps in this region of northern Minnesota. Registers and records document the operation of the camp to the first decade of the twentieth century - prior to the influence of the automobile on the growth of Minnesota's resort industry.

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
