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The Wailuku Elementary School, formerly the Wailuku School, sits on a small grassy slope near the civic center of the Maui County Seat in Wailuku. Originally, a single school building on the campus, it is currently surrounded by modern school buildings. The native stone building was built in 1904 in a random ashlar pattern. The pattern is distinguished by triangular pieces of stone laid in a zig zag pattern. The school is of a single story with a small basement under the left wing of the building. A concrete water table which wraps around the building defines the transition from the main floor to the basement.

The building is entered by a central flight of stairs leading to a front porch. The porch is outset from the building, is built of stone, and has large openings on both sides for light and ventilation. The entrance to the porch is defined by vertical concrete bands. The molding at the edge of the band is carried down the side of the low wall next to the steps, further defining the formality of the entrance. At the bottom front right hand corner of the porch is a cornerstone dated "May 21, 1904."

The interior of the building has been altered over the years to accommodate changing educational needs. However, the original room configuration is easily discernable. The rooms are distributed around a T-shaped corridor. The base of the T is the former entry hall, which is entered from the porch. The transition form the entry hall to the main hall is defined by two elaborately carved consoles at the juncture of the two hallways. A single door on the right hand side of the entry hall originally led to an office. The office also had a door to the lateral hallway. This single office has been subdivided into two spaces. In addition to the office, the front right wing of the building had two classrooms which could be joined by folding or sliding doors. The connecting doors have since been removed and filled with a permanent partition. The classroom nearest the office has likewise been subdivided into two offices, which also required the addition of a new door to the hall. The left front wing likewise had two classrooms. The one closest to the entry hall has been subdivided and is currently used for the school offices. The back of the school building is occupied by three large rooms, two classrooms and a library in the center. Originally the three rooms could be joined by folding or sliding doors. These also have been filled in by permanent partitions. At the ends of the long lateral hallway are exits. A small room, the width of the small entry areas, is located on the back side of the building, one on each end.

The original interior room divisions may be read from a number of features original to the building. The room configurations may be determined by molding which wraps around the ceiling. A transom for ventilation is located above each original door opening. Some of the original doors also remain. These are three panel and have glass door knobs. Because of the double loaded corridor, the classrooms were ventilated by small square openings in the wall which lined the hallway. To decrease noise, the openings have been filled in, although the framing around the original openings remains. The school retains many of its double hung windows, although a portion have been replaced with jalousies.

The Wailuku School is located in the civic district of Wailuku and is significant for its architecture and its educational role. Wailuku had a school by the 1880s. William C. Crook, an early teacher in Maui, recalled that the early school was "a big barn of a wooden building and stood where the present court house is." The bids for a new school were opened on February first 1904. The basic plan had been established prior to the bid, but the exterior treatment was to be of either rubble, brick or cement. The description also called for a mansard roof, but was built with a hipped roof. The early newspaper description detailed a school of eight classrooms and an assembly room, but it was built with only six classrooms. The cornerstone for the new stone building was laid 21 May 1904 by H. P. Baldwin, the senior senator from Maui, the master of ceremonies was Judge McKay and over 1000 people attended the festivities. The cost of the new building was \$25,000. In 1907 the old schoolhouse was torn down.


As in most of the Maui schools in the early twentieth century, the Wailuku school had a high student to teacher ratio; there were 212 students in 1906 and five teachers. By 1922, the school had already grown out of its stone building with 550 pupils and 17 teachers.

The classically proportioned facade and the front porch/portico readily distinguish the Wailuku School as a public institution building of the turn of the century. The specification for a permanent material reinforced the desire for a monumental public building. The Wailuku School is the only example of a stone school in Maui.
