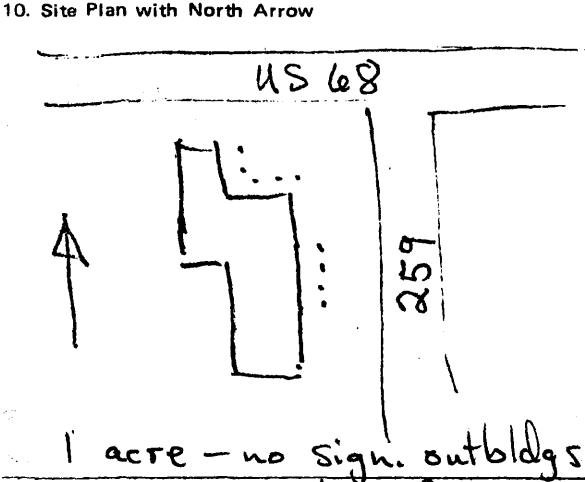

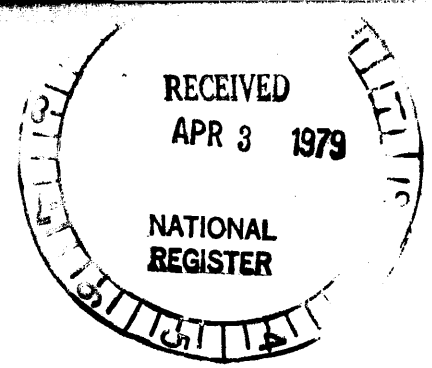
19. History Small community of Hays in which this house was located was ~~named~~ named for the original owner, a local merchant.
