### Section 7: Description

The Modern Woodmen of America Hall is located on the northwest corner of Main and Second streets in downtown Mansfield, Warner Township, Brown County, South Dakota. The one-story vernacular form building was constructed in 1899 to serve as a meeting hall for the Modern Woodmen of America chapter in Mansfield. The frame building, with a front gable roof, has a rectangular floor plan, a stone foundation, weatherboard walls, and an asphalt shingle roof. The building has no basement, but an attic is used for storage. All four elevations exhibit horizontal weatherboard siding, painted white, corner boards, and an outlined roofline (frieze board). A concrete sidewalk is located on the south and east sides of the building, which is situated close to the road.

The main (south) facade has a false front that reaches about twothirds of the height of the roof and exposes the peak of the gable. The main facade features a centered double entrance with double five-panel wood doors, and tall and narrow windows with wood sills, currently boarded up, are located on either side of the main entrance. Above the entrance there are two painted wooden signs; the smaller sign immediately above the entrance reads "MWA HALL," and the larger sign above that reads, "Lawrence Welk Played Here."

The east elevation of the building displays three tall narrow windows evenly spaced across the elevation, which are also currently boarded up, although the original sashes are visible in the interior. On the northern end of the elevation there is a five-panel wood door that is set-in slightly from the building and reached by a concrete step. The southern end of the elevation exhibits a painted wooden sign reading, "Welcome to Mansfield, The Friendly Community, 1882-1982."

The rear (north) elevation has no fenestration openings. The west elevation displays three tall, narrow windows evenly spaced across the elevation, which are currently boarded up. Behind the building there is a small town park, including a basketball net with half-court, a buried time capsule, and a picnic table.

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The interior of the Modern Woodmen Hall of America is one large open space which features a wood floor with boards about three inches wide and wainscoting on the lower three feet of the walls, with the upper portion covered in modern paneling. The original plaster ceiling is covered by modern acoustic tile. The windows are one-over-one sash with wood frames and display bull's-eye millwork detailing.

The Modern Woodmen of America Hall has been used for storage since 1967. The interior was slightly damaged by a leaking roof which has since been repaired. Overall the condition of the building is good and it retains a high degree of integrity.

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#### Section 8: Statement of Significance

The Modern Woodmen of America Hall in Mansfield, Warner Township, Brown County, South Dakota was constructed in 1899 to serve as the meeting hall for Sylvan Lodge #3615. The Modern Woodmen of America Hall is locally significant under Criterion A: History, as the building stands as a testament to the important role fraternal organizations played in the social history of the area. The Modern Woodmen of America Hall can be placed in the historic context "Depression and Rebuilding (1893-1929): Social Organizational Halls" as defined in Historic Contexts for Historic and Architectural Resources in South Dakota by the South Dakota State Historical Preservation Center. The Modern Woodmen of America Hall also can be placed in the context of the Multiple Property Document "Rural Architectural and Historical Resources of Brown County, South Dakota."

### History of the Area

Mansfield, located in Warner Township on the Brown-Spink county line, was platted in 1882 along the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul Railroad line. The town received its name from Irish immigrant John Mansfield, who had donated the land for the platting of the first town. By 1892, the town included a post office, several homes, two stores, depot, blacksmith shop and a saloon all on the Brown County side. The first grain elevator appeared in Mansfield in 1900 and during the first decade of the twentieth century two additional elevators were constructed, as well as a broom factory, and a nursery (1906). The population of Mansfield was reported in the 1900 census as twenty-five, but by 1906 the number of residents had grown to two hundred ("Mansfield File" Dacotah Prairie Museum). With increased development, Mansfield spilled over Main Street in 1904 (the county line) and began southward into neighboring Spink County. A fire in 1910 destroyed many businesses and residential buildings in downtown Mansfield (Brown County Museum and Historical Society 42,59; Sneve, 78).

The population of Warner Township and Mansfield continued to grow with the population of Warner Township reaching 808 in 1930, but by 1945 the growth was diminishing as the population had decreased to 515 (*Sixth Census of the State of South Dakota 1945*, *18*). In 1950 about 200 people and ten businesses were still located in Mansfield. Mansfield has undergone very little growth over more recent years and today (1995) Mansfield remains home to a bank, post office, three grain elevators, garage, repair shop, bar, church, and the old Modern Woodmen of America Hall.

### Modern Woodmen of America

The Modern Woodmen of America (MWA) was organized as a fraternal assessment society on January 5, 1883 by Joseph Cullen Root. Root first formed the society in Lyons, Iowa, with the intentions to "clear away problems of financial security for the members' families" (Schmidt, 218-219). Ironically, Root was expelled from the society because of a feud with the order's head physician. The society's motto is Esto Perpetua and the emblem consisted of an axe, beetle (mallet), wedge, five stars, and branches of palm (Schmidt, 219). The society originally restricted membership to low-risk members and therefore excluded those living in large urban centers and those in the following professions, "railroad brakemen, firemen, engineers, switchmen, miners, employees in gun powder factories, wholesalers and manufacturers of liquor, saloon keepers, bartenders, balloonists, sailors on lakes and seas, plow grinders, brass workers, and professional baseball players" (Schmidt, 219). The society originally also banned women, but in 1895 a womens group was organized, Royal Neighbors of America.

Although the Modern Woodmen of America society first began discussing a reserve fund in 1897, one was never established. The society participated in a number of benevolent activities, largely on a local level and as part of the insurance scheme included an orphan benefit program which provided monthly income and scholarships to young MWA members.

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Today the Modern Woodmen of America serves as a fraternal life insurance society. The national headquarters are located in Rock Island, Illinois and in 1979 there were approximately 500,000 members (Schmidt 219).

### Modern Woodmen of American Hall in Mansfield

In 1899 the Modern Woodmen of America organized Sylvan Lodge #3615 in Mansfield. Washington Holmes and his son, George, took an active role in organizing and building the hall. The onestory, vernacular form, frame hall had a stage with a handpainted stage curtain, painted by Roy Muir of Northville, South Dakota (Dacotah Prairie Museum Files "Brown County Towns"). The MWA Hall was used as a meeting place, as well as for many social activities in the town over the years including church bazaars, school graduations, boxing matches, traveling shows, movies, dances, parties, plays, and socials (Mansfield Centennial Committee, 20). The hall also served as the temporary location for the Remde Store in 1910, when their building burned down in the fire that destroyed many businesses in town (Dacotah Prairie Museum Files, "Brown County Towns").

The Modern Woodmen of America Hall also has an interesting history as the temporary meeting place of the Klu Klux Klan from 1918-1919 during its brief existence in Mansfield. Perhaps the MWA Hall is best known for the event which it advertises on its front facade as a location where the young Lawrence Welk performed. The singer/entertainer, from North Dakota, played in the area with two or three-piece bands during his early career (Brown County Museum and Historical Society 140-141).

In 1954, the American Legion leased the hall, at which time the original stage and a painted stage curtain were removed for the remodelling which added a kitchen to the building. The American Legion continued to use the hall for meetings, parties, dances, and opened it for roller skating for the local children (Mansfield Centennial Committee, 20). The Wiltfang brothers, Daryl and Walter, of Mansfield purchased the building in 1967 and have used it for storage ever since.

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In conclusion, the Modern Woodmen of America Hall in Mansfield represents an excellent example of a surviving building of an early fraternal organization in Brown County. The Modern Woodmen of America Hall's period of significance extends from its construction in 1899 through the historic period to 1945, which is the fifty year cut-off for National Register properties. The hall, nominated under Criterion A for its historical significance, served not only as the meeting place of the Modern Woodmen, but also as a social center of activities for the entire community of Mansfield and its surrounding area. The vernacular building is in good condition and represents the importance fraternal organizations played in a small rural town/area at the end of the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries.
