# Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance attach photo

The Judge Ralston House is a two-story, wood frame structure, which now rests on a concrete basement added in 1951. The hipped roof is covered with asphalt shingles and is penetrated by two brick chimneys. A two-story rectanular window bay with a gable roof is located on the south elevation. An enclosed entry porch on the east facade has double paneled doors, paneled frieze, and heavy brackets supporting a pedimented gable. The exterior of the house is covered with drop siding; and windows are one-over-one light, tall and narrow, double-hung sash. The wide plain window surrounds have narrow shelf heads and decorative aprons. A two-story, hip-roofed rear addition and a side sunporch were added to the house about 1905. The handsome millwork of the interior is original and typical of the period. The two front parlors are separated by four-panel pocket doors, and each has its own entry door accessible from the enclosed front porch.

## 8. SIGNIFICANCE

#### a. History

John M. Ralston (1869-1963) was a native of Nova Scotia, who arrived in Port Townsend in 1889. Employed at first by the city's fire department, he began to study law and was admitted to the bar in 1895. Three years later he was elected city attorney. For many years (1912-1940) he served as superior court judge for Jefferson and Clallam counties, and was later called from retirement to serve again (1944-45). In 1898 he married Lizzie A. Waite of Massachusetts and they purchased this "farmhouse" on Morgan Hill in order to raise goats for milk for their children. The Ralstons made some alterations to their home, but later (1919) sold it and moved to Port Angeles.

## b. Evaluation of Significance

Even with the early twentieth century additions, the Judge Ralston House remains one of Port Townsend's most handsome Victorian residences outside the historic district. Its association with the highly respected and long term judge gives it a special significance in Jefferson County history.
