Silas Yager was born in 1795 perhaps in Virginia. His father was Benjamin Yager who was born in Culpeper County, Virginia in 1768 and later came to Oldham County, Kentucky. Silas B. Yager married Louisa Clore in Oldham County in 1826. The Yagers, Clores and Wilhoites were Oldham County families who came from Virginia and were descended from the early settlers of the Germanna Colonies in Virginia. These settlers were Germans from the Palatinate who were brought to Virginia under the sponsorship of Governor Spotswood primarily to build and work in iron furnaces. The first Germanna Colonies were in Orange County, part of which later became Culpeper County.

After Silas Yager's death in 1866 his widow married John Williamson whose family had settled in this area of Jefferson County in the early 1800s. In 1880 Louisa Yager Williamson gave title to the house and 314 acres of land to her niece Louisa Hardin. The house was owned by the Hardin family until 1933.

# Description

The stone house and the log cabin are not connected. The ca. 1830s stone house is a two-story, double-pile structure with four rooms on each story. There are two front doors and no central hall. A one-story, clapboard ell was added to the stone house, date unknown but probably in the late nineteenth century. A second one-story clapboard wing was added at the rear of the ell, probably in the early twentieth century. The dormers are turn-of-the-century additions. The front porch is a twentieth-century addition, although some type of porch may have existed earlier. The present porch was screened until the 1970s when jalousied windows were added.

The log structure is a one-story, two-room house which has the appearance of a saddle bag-type cabin. However it was probably built in two stages - the left section being built first as a single-pen cabin and the right single-pen part being added later. The log house probably predates the stone house and may have been the first house on the site. The log house was weatherboarded and is in poor condition.

### Significance

The Yager house is one of the most significant, nineteenth-century stone houses in Jefferson County. It is one of only two double-pile, two-story stone houses in the county and the other example is a Federal, side-hall plan house (JF-349 Benjamin Head house, NR-June 1974). The two front doors of the Yager house are features not common in Jefferson County architecture.

# Boundary Description

The boundary of the Yager house nomination is shown as a red line on the attached aerial photo. (SCALE: 1''=200'). The nominated site contains approximately  $\frac{1}{4}$  acre and includes the main house and the log cabin.
