DESCRIPTION:

The Aiken's Hotel is a rectangular two-story molded concrete block structure with single-light double-hung sash windows, paneled single-light doors, and a small, one-story concrete block rear ell. Original windows and doors seem to be intact. Details include classically massed porch posts and a denticulated cornice. There is a rear ell, parts of which date from 1909 through 1914 and parts from 1914 through 1923. The concrete block enclosure of the front porch is a much more recent--and reversible--alteration that the owners plan to remove in an Economic Recovery Tax Act project that will restore the porch to its 1910 appearance. The enclosed photograph depicts that project in progress.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Aiken's Hotel is representative of the development of a small commercial center to serve the rural settlement of Eagle during the period 1902 to 1910. During those eight years Eagle's main street, which is also a highway connecting Boise with other valley centers, gained a grocery store, an Odd Fellows' Building, the Eagle Drug, the Aiken's Hotel, and a few other businesses. The hotel is associated with the major developer-promoter of Eagle, Tom Aiken, who had the building constructed. The hotel is architecturally significant as a representative of early concrete block construction in the Boise Valley, a type of construction that became popular in about 1900. According to one source, the blocks were manufactured in Eagle. The classical elements of the porch (as originally built) and the denticulated cornice are also representative of the colonial revival style popular during the first decade of the century. Parts of the rear ell date from 1909 to 1914 and parts from 1914 to 1923; they should be considered additions of signifi-The alterations to the front porch do not belong to the period within cance. which the hotel achieved significance, but they do leave half of the main facade and the remaining three exposures entirely visible.

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Among Eagle's commercial buildings from the period 1902 through 1910, the Aiken's Hotel is one of the very few to remain unmasked by the Western-motif wooden false fronts that are required by the town's commercial design ordinance. The hotel's eligibility for listing in the National Register of Historic Places makes it eligible for a variance from the ordinance.
