The short stories and poetry of Bret Harte represent a milestone in the development of local color literature in the United States. He was followed by an entire school of local colorists, few of whom could match the clear, exciting descriptions found in "The Luck of Roaring Camp", or the wide appeal of "Plain Language of Truthful James" His literary moment was fleeting, but at his best Harte illuminated one aspect of American literature as had no other before him.

He is aptly described by one of his biographers as an "argonaut and exile." For most of his life in America, Harte lived with relatives or in a succession of boardinghouse, hotels, and rented dwellings. All but a handful of these have been either destroyed or greatly altered, and of those remaining, "The Willows" is the most interesting and intact residence associated with his career. From 1873 to 1876, he and his family occupied four different houses in Morristown, New Jersey. Harte was away lecturing much of the time. He lived at the Revere House, renting from the retired General, in 1874-5 and perhaps for a longer period. Though Harte called Morristown a "bigoted, self-righteous, hypocritical place," he found its environment superior to that of New York boardinghouses.

Born Francis Bret Harte in Albany, New York in 1836 he moved to California at age eighteen after a childhood of wandering. By 1871 he had written several popular short stories concerning the wilderness in which he worked and soon decided to come back East to write.

But after leaving the West Harte could not maintain his former excellence and flair for "local color" and was forced into second rate mimicry of his earlier achievements.

Hartes' works include: <u>The Lost Galleon and Other Tales(1867)</u>, "The Luck of Roaring Camp"(1868), "The Outcasts of Poker Flat"(1869),& <u>Gabriel Conroy(1876)</u>. Bret Harte was also the editor of <u>Overland</u> <u>Monthly</u>, and a writer for <u>Atlantic Monthly</u>. A play, <u>Ah. Sin</u>, on which he collaborated with Mark Twain in 1877 was a dismal failure.

Harte died in 1902, living in England; a country in which his popularity had not waned.

MILITARY.

General Joseph Warren Revera, commander of the Seventh New Jersey Regiment and, later, the Second New Jersey Brigade during the Civil War, was one of the wars' most capable generals, although nearly fifty years old when the South seceede from the Union. Joseph W. Revere, first owner of The Willows, was a grandson of the famous Paul Revere.

ARCHITECTURE.

Joseph Revere designed this house in 1854 hoping to retire on the estate. Although Revere had no formal training as an architect "The Willows" has been described as one of New Jersey's finest examples of Gothic Revival or Carpenters Gothic.

ART.

Revere also had no training as an artist, but apparently had a natural flair or talent for painting; as the elaborate murals, done by Revere, in the dining room attest.

10. Geographical Data (cont)

Boundaries of the historic area of "The Willows" are as follows: from the intersection of Kahdena Road and Mendham Avenue, north along Kahdena Road to its intersection with the property line; west and south along the property line to its intersection with Washington Valley Road; east along this road to its intersection with Mendham Road; east along Mendham Avenue to its intersection with Kahdena Road.
