DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Located in a residential area near downtown Stockton, the Moses Rodgers House is a two story rectangular building of clapboard construction approximately twenty-five feet wide by forty feet long. The house is a simple eclectic vernacular building with a double sash window, a curved colonial revival porch, and a steep front gable. There is a single stack chimney in the center of the house, and double hung sash windows interrupt all four walls. The interior has been altered by installation of linoleum and painting over the original woodwork. A shed addition has been attached to the rear. Besides these alterations the bulding has deteriorated from weathering and is generally in need of repair.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Moses Rodgers House, the home of a prominent black mining engineer, was built in 1898 and is significant for its historic associations with the development of gold mining in California and the black community in Stockton.

The details of Moses Rodgers early life are sketchy, but it is known that he was born a slave in Missouri, although the exact date of his birth is unknown. Somehow he managed to acquire "an education as a mining engineer", and immigrated to California in 1849 to participate in the Gold Rush, He settled in the Mariposa mining district at the town of Hornitos where he soon established a reputation as a superior mining engineer. Rodgers' opinion on mining matters was valued by people throughout the state. Investors often consulted him before purchasing mining claims and stock. Rodgers acquired a number of mines in the Mariposa district.

In the 1860's Rodgers married Sahra Quivers of Snelling, California; they had five daughters. In order to take advantage of superior school facilities for blacks, Rodgers moved his family to Stockton in 1890. In 1898 he "built an elegant home. . . located in one of the best residence streets of the town". He continue to manage his mining interests and act as a consultant. Rodgers was the first person to drill successfully for natural gas in Stockton, although he could not get investors to back his operation. Consequently he was not able to capitalize on his initial success.

Rodgers lived in the Moses Rodgers House until his death after the turn of the century. The house remained in the Rodgers family until 1971 when it was sold to Tony Pena who presently rents it.

The neighborhood in which the Rodgers House is located contains houses of compatible scale and design, many of which were built during the same period as the Rodgers residence. The nominated property has deteriorated, but the building is structurally sound and could be rehabilitated. Despite the apparent deterioration the Moses Rodgers House retains its importance as an historic building significant to the development of Stockton's black community.
