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#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Federal Post Office and Courthouse is located in the central business district of Mankato on a principal downtown artery.

The massive Richardsonian Romanesque structure fronts on Second Street and includes two principal entrances on this street and a third entrance on Hickory. Extensive loading facilities for postal vehichles are located to the rear.

The building is of rock-faced buff-colored Mankato stone, with smooth-faced courses at the first story sill level, between the first and second stories, and at the frieze level under the eaves. Symmetrical fenestration is composed of double hung arcaded windows at both the first and second levels. Transons are arched on the second level and rectangular on the first level. The broad smooth-faced arches of the two principal entrances on Second Street spring from piers capped by foliate designs in carved stone. A recessed area is located at the second story above each of the entrances. A secondary entrance on the Hickory Street side also utilizes the archway and decorative foliate designs on the piers, but includes rock-faced stone voussiors rather than a smooth-faced arch. Wall-mounted light standards flank this entrance.

The broad hipped roof of the structure is pierced on the south and north by hiproofed dormers. The wide overhanging eaves are supported by modillions. A stone chimney is at a central location.

The building was constructed in three principal phases. The original structure included the northwestern portion of the present building, including the north entrance on Second Street and the groupings of four windows on either side of this entrance. A tall, square, flat-roofed clock tower was originally situated over the entrance on this section. The tower was removed at an uncertain date, and in 1932, the building was expanded to the south by more than twice its original size. The materials and design of this addition were meticulously matched with the original so that the expanded building appears as a unified whole. In 1965, the building was again enlarged. This addition, which again made use of similar materials, is located at the rear (towards Broad Street) and is not generally visible from the principal facades.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Federal Post Office and Courthouse is primarily significant for the imposing strength of its Richardsonian Romanesque design. The central clock tower commanded a dominant image for the original structure; the 1932 remodeling changed the building's emphasis to a ponderous horizontal mass, but retained the integrity of the Romanesque styling, and the building continues to occupy an eminent position in downtown Mankato. The relative simplicity and ordered use of the Romanesque detailing contribute to the strength of the structure's design. The building is one of three in the Mankato downtown area to made extensive use of local stone. The courtrooms have been used for the Second Division of U.S. District Court until recent decades.
