Irregular in plan, the Castle is a single unit, two-store building with a wine cellar and small tower rooms. front facade, eleven bays are apparent. The Exterior wall material, both visible and supporting, is stone with irregular coursing of rock-faced, squared stone. Some framing for support, with half-timbering in upper remodeled Tudor storey. The front and side facades are buttressed with attached, simple buttresses, about every twenty feet. Now of clay tile, the roof shape is modified Tudor with eves barely overhanging; no raking type There are two chimneys, one slightly off-center roof trim. front, the other rear, both single stack units are irregular in plan. No projecting windows, no dormers. Surrounds of all the windows are of utmost simplicity, painted in dark brown and white. The main window is of the swing type, with second floor windows of different size and style than the first floor. The rear and side windows any smaller, but of the same type. The main door is set in over six inches with stone face setting. Door surround of head and sides is also of utmost simplicity, painted sills and headers; no transom The front stair is a straight approach, with four stairs. Apparent alterations: \$2 million spent by E. B. Hendrie to convert the second storey of the front facade from a crenelated parapet fortress to modified Tudor. 1910, the northwest wing was added with J. J. B. Benedict as architect; in 1924, the southwest wing war added with Maurice Biscoe directing.

Details of note: Limestone, handcarved in various places is from Castle Rock, Colorado; in alterations, more Castle Rock limestone was used. Limestone coat of arms above the main door and shield details carved and placed on second storey, east facade. Sandstone bust of Frederick Barbarossa, "Red Beard" at northwest corner of the house. The moat has been covered with soil. The interior panelling is of dark oak, as is the floor; also golden oak with marble fireplaces and leaded glass windows in dining room with French doors. Hand tooled leather wall coverings. Interior plaster wall surfaces have been recently repainted. The floors are wood joist; golden oak with mahogany edging; wooden pegs throughout

The castle is set in the northeasterly section of the remaining property. Outside of the castle and milkhouse the property is solely devoted landscaping and park-like grounds.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE Built in 1886-1887 on the prairies fifteen miles east of downtown Denver, the castle stands today as a monument to the industry, fearlessness, imagination, and romanticism of its builder, Baron Walter von Richthofen, scion of the well-established von Richthofen family of Prussia. family was known originally as gentlemen farmers, raising merino sheep, and dairy herds, and as huntsmen and horseback riders.

Baron von Richthofen was born in Silesia, East Germany, He was the uncle of German flying ace Manfred von Richthofen, and one of the most colorful characters to hit the Wild West. Having fought in the Franco-Prussian and Austro-German wars, he came to America to escape the regimented life to which his notable military record had condemned him.

Backed by German and English capital, Richthofen purchased 320 acres which he named "Montclair" which he planned to develop into a health and recreational resort. house, or "molkery", was connected by a 300 foot underground passage to the castle. The rich milk from the herd of Jersey cows which Richthofen imported from Switzerland was to be used in the treatment of tuberculosis. Plans for a 300 bed hospital and sanitarium were also drawn up.

The Baron also built an art gallery at 8th and Monaco where he exhibited a collection worth \$500,000.00. when Denverites protested to the "lewd, brazen" pictures. Richthofen amiably turned the gallery into a casino, and

part of his land into a new residential development.

Eventually, he met and married English-born Louise Ferguson. They were a devoted couple, and the baroness took her place as mistress of the castle where they entertained royally. At first, the baroness had been reluctant to live at Richthofen because it was too stark and cheerless, so the baron set out roses and red geraniums, imported several hundred canaries, turned them loose on the grounds, and moved his bride in.

when the crash came in 1893, von Richthofen tried desparately to save his multi-million-dollar development. Failing, he took jobs of one kind and another, and finally, he travelled over Colorado with a wagon and team selling books. Broken in health and spirit, Walter von Richthofen died in 1898 at the age of 50. His dream of the great health resort materialized when the world-famed Phipps sanitarium for tuberculosis was built from the Richthofen plans and in that section of the city.

The Montclair addition was saved for the baroness by a German syndicate. The Richthofen place was sold several times for a club. Then in 1910 the home was purchased by Edwin B. Hendrie, president of Hendrie and Bolthoff, Company, one of the world's greatest mining machinery distributing and supply companies. Hendrie's daughter Gertrude and her husband W. W. Grant, Jr., and their family then occupied the castle, comprising the third family of important Denver pioneers to find their home within its fortress-like walls. The fourth famous Denver frontier family to live in Richthofen was that of John Thams, owner of the Elephant Corral, the famous livery stable of Denver's gold rush days.

The City of Denver has recognized the importance of this building to its history, and designated the castle as a Denver Landmark on June 11, 1973. The molkery has been purchased by the city, and now houses the Montclair Community Association. Montclair, now a middle class residential area noted for its green lawns and old trees is permeated with the name, deeds.

In addition to the castle and milkhouse is the fountain or trough at the intersection of Richthofen Parkway, Oneida Street and Oneida Place. Constructed by the city of Denver from funds left in trust by the baron, who had originally intended it as a memorial to his son, the semi-circular structure is of pink granite with tall wrought iron lamp posts at either end, a large iron flower urn at the top center has two spouts at each side of the center from which water flows to the trough below. Cut in stone above the trough is a fitting tribute to this man who dreamed of doing so much for his fellow man:

"He prayeth well who loveth man, birds and beasts."

Although the panic of 1893 prevented completion of the development, a decade of planning and labor was put into it, and the massive castle with its surrounding estate is a notable monument to the faith of the pioneers.

The Richthofen Castle is perhaps and of the most remarkable residential structures in Denver. The retains all of its original beauty of fine craftsmanship and stands in except lent condition amidst well-preserved surroundings. The capable to which it has been preserved and the lack of entruding influences sets it apart from other structures of its age and size. It is perhaps the only "castle" like structure in Denver of any size and is certainly the most well-preserved. The surrounding neighborhood has and does take quite a bit of pride and direction from the castle


