Reportedly (Evansville Press, 21 July 1929), it was also the city's first "chateau." It was a classic design featuring dark red brick showcasing white stone trim, a hip roof and multiple, gabled wall dormers. Neiterts lived in the house until the mid-1930s. It is better known as the Wilfred C. Bussing house.

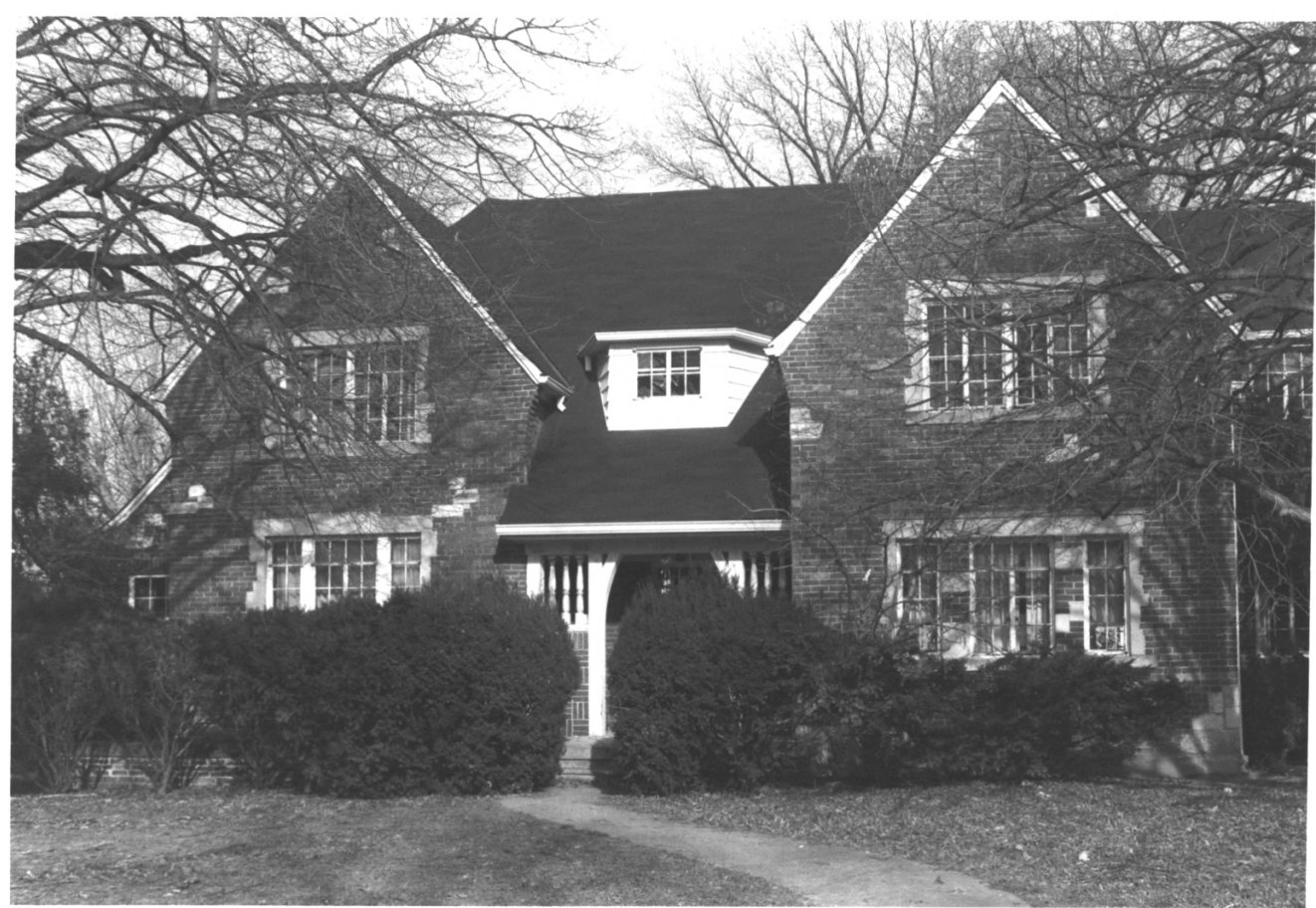
