Description

The Plainview Band Shell complex is located near the northwest corner of a city park in Plainview, a small town in northeastern Nebraska. Constructed between 1939 and 1942 by the Works Progress Administration (WPA), the concrete band shell and its related features are excellent examples of the moderne architectural style used for public buildings and structures constructed by the WPA and other New Deal public works programs. The nomination consists of one contributing building: the band shell, and 10 contributing objects: 5 concrete benches; 1 concrete drinking fountain; and 4 concrete light posts. The nominated area measures less than one acre and is partially surrounded by original landscaping consisting of rows of Scotch pines and elm trees. The area contains a small (8 x 16 feet), non-contributing rest room building (c. 1960). A large concrete basketball court is located between the band shell, fountain, and benches, surrounded by basketball hoops and lights; these features, however, do not detract from the overall architectural and historic integrity.

The Plainview Band Shell, fountain, benches, and light posts are located near the southeast corner of Harper and Main streets in Plainview, a small northeastern Nebraska town (1990 population: 1,333). Designed by Norfolk, Nebraska architect Elbert B. Watson, the band shell, benches, fountain, and light posts were constructed between 1939 and 1942 as a Works Progress Administration (WPA) project. When the band shell was constructed in the late 1930's and early '40's, it was part of a large, four block area known as Athletic Park which was later divided.

Currently, the band shell is located in a 3.26 acre area known as Band Shell Park. Due to later construction and alterations within this area, including playground equipment and modern shelters, the present nomination is limited to an area of less than one acre at the extreme northwest corner of Band Shell Park near the intersection of Harper and Main streets. The band shell is located near the northwest corner of this area and its main facade faces to the southeast. A 205×260 foot concrete basket ball court extends 30 yards south of the main facade of the band shell; nine yards south of the court are five cast concrete benches which face the band shell. Less than 10 feet south of the benches is a covered, cast concrete drinking fountain.

The area is accessed by a gravel road which enters on the west edge (Main Street). The area is bordered on the north and west by symmetrical rows of Scotch pines and elm trees, part of the original WPA landscaping. An undetermined number of cast concrete benches were originally located in rows parallel to the east, south and west sides of the band shell. Through time most of these benches deteriorated or were vandalized; today only five remain.

The main features within the nominated area are described as follows:

1. Band shell (Photos 1, 2, 3, and 4). The moderne style round arched, half-domed band shell features cast concrete construction, a raised stage, integral storage and dressing rooms. The building measures approximately 50 by 16 feet; the semi-circular round arch is approximately 33 feet in diameter. A concrete platform extends the entire length of the main (southeast) facade in front of the shell; an additional tier of three steps extends 3/4 the length of the platform. The main facade of the band shell is flanked by concrete piers which extend above the round arch; these piers feature moderne style fluting.

Description (continued)

The rear (northwest) facade of the band shell has a 50 by 16 foot rectangular projection which contains men's and women's dressing rooms, rest rooms, and storage areas. The projection is accessed by a rounded doorway located in the center of the band shell which opens into a 4 foot wide hallway that extends along the north wall, and by exterior doors at the northwest and northeast corners of the building. Each side of the hallway has a storage area, dressing room, and steps which descend to the exterior doors and rest rooms.

2. Benches (Photos 1, 3, and 5). Five cast concrete benches are located 39 yards south of the main facade of the band shell. Each bench is approximately 8 feet long and 3 feet tall with a flared concrete base and narrow arm rests.

3. Drinking Fountain (Photos 1, 3, 5, 6, and 7). A covered drinking fountain constructed of cast concrete with a brick base is located less than 12 feet south of the benches. The drinking fountain, 6 feet square and approximately 9 feet in height, features Gothic arched openings on all four sides and fluted, corner piers similar to the band shell.

4. Light Posts (Photo 1). Four cast concrete light posts are symmetrically located 6 1/2 feet from the northwest, northeast, southwest, and southeast edges of the concrete basketball court. The light posts, approximately 12 feet in height, feature glass globes and flared concrete bases.

The concrete basketball court located between the band shell, fountain, and benches is a later alteration to the site. The court, however, is likely an extension of the band shell's original "asphalt paving" cited in newspaper accounts (<u>Plainview News</u>: June 24, 1942). Basket ball hoops, a flagpole, modern lights, and a wooden birdhouse on a metal pole are located to the east, west, and southeast of the court, but are not sufficient scale, or size, to detract from the overall integrity of the nominated area. The non-contributing (c. 1960) rest room building is located at the southwest edge of the nominated area.

Statement of Significance

The Plainview Band Shell, fountain, benches, and light posts are being nominated to the National Register at the state level of significance under Criterion A for their association with the Works Progress Administration (WPA), and under Criterion C as excellent examples of cast concrete construction executed in the moderne style. The period of significance, 1939-1942, includes the year of initial construction through the completion of the band shell and its associated structure and objects.

The Plainview Band Shell, fountain, lights, and benches, were constructed between 1939 and 1942 through labor and funds made possible by the Works Progress Administration (WPA). Established during the presidency of Franklin Delano Roosevelt, the WPA was the most extensive and far-reaching of several nationwide work relief programs designed to alleviate the unemployment of the Great Depression. Like its contemporaneous work programs the WPA was developed to provide employment in public works that would benefit society as a whole. Projects included art, music, and literature as well as roads, dams, bridges, schools, post offices, and courthouses.

Statement of Significance (continued)

As noted in Phoebe Cutler's <u>The Public Landscape of the New Deal</u> (1985), a far-reaching legacy of the WPA is found in the thousands of parks and recreational facilities constructed in cities and towns throughout the nation. The Plainview Band Shell is a typical example of the intentions and results of the WPA. Designed to accommodate a variety of community uses such as plays, concerts, and speeches, construction of the band shell provided employment for as many as 20 WPA workers for several years. Since its completion in 1942, the band shell continues to serve as a recreational and cultural facility for the residents of Plainview and the surrounding area.

In 1935, the area that would become Athletic Park was purchased by the city of Plainview from a local resident. A year later it was leveled and graded by Works Progress Administration (WPA) labor. At the beginning of 1938, extensive plans for the park were announced in the <u>Plainview News</u> (Jan. 19, 1938). New developments would include construction of a grandstand with seating for approximately 475 people; tennis courts, baseball diamond improvements, picnic and playground areas, horseshoe pits, tennis courts, and landscaping. The plans also cited a band shell with raised platform, dressing rooms and storage space.

In March and June of 1938, Norfolk, Nebraska architect Elbert B. Watson received payment from WPA funds for his band shell plans. Due to other WPA park developments occurring in the park at the time, construction of the band shell was gradual. According to the <u>Norfolk Daily News</u> (July 17, 1941), the project was initiated in June, 1939; two years later, in July, 1941, the building was not yet completed because of intervening park projects. The newspaper noted that 15 to 20 men had been employed almost exclusively on the band shell for several months and would soon finish.

The history of the Plainview Band Shell is indicative of the gradual end of the WPA and the nation's increasing involvement in World War II. According to available newspaper accounts and historical sources, although the band shell was a substantial new building for a community the size of Plainview, it was never officially dedicated. In the summer of 1942, the paving in front of the shell was completed but the facility had already been used for concerts. An opening dance was held in July 1942; it was also a "Victory rally." A month later in August, 1942, the American Legion invited all Pierce County inductees to an evening's entertainment prior to their departure for military service. (Plainview News, July 29, 1942; Aug. 5, 1942).

The Plainview Band Shell is significant on the state-wide level for its association with the WPA and as an excellent and well-preserved example of cast concrete construction executed in the moderne style. To date, the on-going Nebraska Historic Buildings Survey (NeHBS) has identified four comparable band shells; two are already listed as part of courthouse square nominations (JO07-001; SW09-196). The others are located in Grant and Auburn, county-seats in southwestern and southeastern Nebraska, respectively (PK04-023; NH01-069). Both the Grant and Auburn band shells are c. 1936 features within larger WPA parks. Constructed of brick and concrete, and stone and concrete, these buildings do not feature the distinctive cast concrete construction or moderne architectural style of the Plainview Band Shell.




Verbal Boundary Description

Boundary Justification


The boundary contains the tract of land which has historically been associated with the band shell, fountain, light posts, and benches.





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
