The Beall-Dawson House, Rockville, is located on the north side of Montgomery Street at the junction of Montgomery Street and West Middle Lane.

This is a large Federal house, well constructed and typical of Montgomery County brick houses of the early nineteenth century. The house is composed of three block telescope plan.

The main block of the house is three bays wide and three bays deep. It is two-and-a-half stories in height with a moderately pitched "A" roof. The front (south) of the house is laid in Flemish bond with a very smooth brick mortared with good grapevine joints. The sides, rear (north) and wing are of rougher brick laid in common bond.

All the windows have flat brick arches on the main house; the first story windows have twelve-over-twelve sashes while those on the second floor are twelve over eight. The windows are unusually large and wide for a house of this period.

The narrow six-panel front door has a rectangular, three-pane transom.

A chimney is enclosed in each end wall of the house. The gable end walls rise higher than the roof making a roof curtain with squared brick corbels at the south and north.

A three-string brick cornice with the middle row of bricks laid in a diagonal decorates the roofline.

A large stair hall window between the floors is on the north facade of the house.

The interior of the main block has an entrance hall along the east wall. A large arch with radial pilasters of rope molding and small acanthus leaf molding divides the hall. Rising from the north end is a delicate staircase.

Fan and medallion-style carving define the chair rail throughout the main section; the plaster acanthus leaf cornice of the hall is repeated only in the parlor. An Adam mantel has fluted Ionic colonettes, swags, pineapples, medallions, dolphins and acanthus leaves. Marble surrounds the fireplace.

The doors have six panels and applied molding. The window and door jambs and the area beneath the recessed windows are paneled.

disregard for the early history of Rockville as an architectural community. The house is one of only a few structures still standing significant to the heritage of the area.

The house serves the community as the headquarters of the Montgomery County Historical Society which maintains a library and exhibit in the building. The Society opens the Beall-Dawson House in the afternoons from Tuesday through Saturday.

In 1815 Upton Beall, one of the first Clerks of the Montgomery County Court, built the Beall-Dawson House. Beall and his father were among the most prominent citizens in the first year of the county's history. He was a member of the Scottish family that came to Maryland in the seventeenth century and settled throughout western Maryland. Two twentieth-century United States Senators from Maryland have borne the name Beall.

According to tradition, the Marquis de Lafayette visited the Beall-Dawson House during his 1824 tour of the United States.

The house remained in the hands of the descendants of Upton Beall until the twentieth century. In 1965 the City of Rockville with the Montgomery County Historical Society purchased the house to be used as the Society's headquarters. The latter organization gave the legal title in its entirety to the municipality. The city's support of the preservation of this house is noteworthy.

bays long on the south facade. There are two windows on the north. A large brick arch filled with frame work and a door after its construction is located in the two bays nearest the main section. The middle section repeats the architectural features of the main block although it is smaller in scale being only one room deep.

The third section of the "telescope" is a twentiethcentury frame, one-story wing in keeping with the style of the rest of the building.

The two wings are used as a residence for the curator.

North of the Beall-Dawson House stands a small, brick outbuilding which was probably a smoke house.

The Montgomery County Historical Society plans (1972) to use the garage as a museum.
