

Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The August F. Poehler House is located on the north side of Main Street at the foot of the bluff on Henderson's west side. The prominent house occupies a spacious lot overlooking downtown Henderson. The former Sibley County Courthouse is located to the east and the public school to the north, atop the hill.

The stately residence was designed in the Queen Anne style by Mankato architect George Pass and constructed in 1883-84 at a cost of \$39,000. The large brick house consists of two units, a large two-and-a-half story section of an irregular plan and a one story summer kitchen on the west side. The two story section features high gabled roofs with towering fluted chimneys. Windows are both rectilinear and arched. Decorative cut wood transom panels are utilized over some windows while hoods with keystones and dripstones adorn others. Half round and quarter round windows are located in the gable ends. An angled two-story bay is situated on the southeast corner of the building flanked by a first-level entry on either side. The brick surfaces are broken by continuous stone sills on both floors and relief brickwork on the exterior end chimneys and on a checkerboard frieze beneath the bracketted cornice. The large porch which wraps around the southeast corner of the house replaced the original porch and balcony after the turn-of-the-century. The summer kitchen utilizes similar but simpler design features.

The house retains excellent interior as well as exterior integrity. The well preserved building presently houses the Sibley County Historical Museum.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The August F. Poehler House is significant both for its association with a prominent and influential early Henderson settler and as a well preserved example of the residences constructed by area entrepreneurs in the more successful communities during the mid to late nineteenth century. August F. Poehler emigrated to Henderson from Germany in 1856 to join two older brothers, Fred and Henry, who had started a mercantile business in the fledgling community of Henderson, which had been platted on the Minnesota River the previous year. August, at 18, took charge of the fur trading end of a business based on a trading post, fur trading, and government contracts. The Poehler Brothers business prospered and branched into lumber, grain, and milling, becoming a major commercial interest in the area. August Poehler became the sole owner of the business in 1887. He contracted with Mankato architect George Pass to design the family residence in 1883, at a time when the family business had achieved a great deal of success and the Minnesota River town of Henderson had become a flourishing center in the county, serving as the county seat and an important center of trade and commerce. The building remains a prominent element in the now quiet river town, reflective of an earlier period of prominence and of the success achievable by area entrepreneurs during the late nineteenth century.
