DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The house is built on a modified "T" plan and has two and one-half stories. The delicate rhythm of the lathe-turned railing and spindles of the many porches relieve the austerity of the bare red-brick walls broken only by the smooth stone lintels and sills. The walls are topped by a corbelled cornice which is returned under the gable with its latticework infill over the upper story's triple windows. The roof has metal shingles. The overall effect of the exterior is one of austere rectitude.

The main entrance, living room, parlor and stairway front the west side and face the Jennie's Creek Road which goes off to the south of U.S. 460.

The stem of the "T" extending easterly from the abovementioned portion contains two kitchens and the dining room. There is one large fireplace in each of the ten 15' x 18' rooms, with a total of four chimneys. Ceilings are ten feet high, walls are wainscot of three feet high with the upper seven feet plaster. Woodwork is dark oak.

The Davis house has a commanding location on a hillside. For years it was the first large brick house seen by travelers approaching Paintsville

The Daniel Davis House is located on ground where a Civil War battle occurred. On January 7, 1862, Colonel James D. Garfield sent his union troops to displace the Confederate Cavalry who were stationed at the mouth of Jennie's Creek. The Confederates retreated in defeat. This skirmish was a prelude to the January 10, 1862, Battle of Middle Creek.

Daniel Davis first occupied the house that was built on this site on April 6, 1889.

The Daniel Davis Home was the equivalent of a community center from its occupancy in 1889 until the death of its owner in 1919. The builder, Daniel Davis (1844-1919), was a large landowner, an operator of a tannery and shoe factory, a leading merchant and banker--serving as the first and only President of the Paintsville National Bank (now the First National Bank) from 1902 until his death. Davis was also the producer and manufacturer of tobacco.

The Davis House was a community center largely owing to its location on a widely traveled route. It served as commercial, cultural, political, news, and information center because of the traffic movement from Jennie's Creek and Paint Creek to other parts of the state and region.

Davis was also active in political affairs and although he never ran for an office, he was an importanct figure in the power structure of the Republican Party in eastern Kentucky. He served many times as a delegate to Republican National Conventions.

Although not elaborate by the standards of many communities, the house itself has a severe dignity that, combined with the prominent site, makes it outstanding among the "Mountain Mansions" of Eastern Kentucky.
