7. Description

Located on a prominent site in the center of Mackworth Island, the Baxter Summer Home is closely surrounded by several long, rectangular two story school buildings. This complex is in turn surrounded by mostly unspoiled terrain consisting of a mixture of open fields and woodland.

The nominated property is a two-and-one-half story residential building constructed of dark red Tapestry brick. The roof is hipped with green terra cotta tiles and the foundation is random coursed fieldstone. A one-story enclosed porch extends from the south side while on the northeast corner is a one-story circular solarium. The windows are either casement or fixed sash with multi-pane lights, except for the dormers which have double-hung sash. There are four brick chimneys.

The house has two principal entrances, each with classical porticos. The principal (east) entrance has a door enframed by sidelights and transom. The transom contains stained art glass with sailing motifs. Enclosing this doorway, and its identical counterpart on the north side, is a pedimented portico supported on Ionic columns and Doric pilasters.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Baxter Summer Home is historically important as the residence of Percival P. Baxter, a governor of Maine and one of the most important conservationists the state has produced. The building is also architecturally significant as a distinguished work of Portland architect, Frederick Thompson, who had a large practice at the turn-of-the-century.

Governor Baxter's father, James Phinney Baxter, purchased Mackworth Island in 1885. He first built a cottage on this site, which was moved elsewhere on the island and later destroyed. The elder Baxter also built the present house as a summer home in 1917-1918. Baxter, a mayor of Portland, historian and president of the Maine Historical Society, was an important public figure himself. He left the property to his son, who served as governor of Maine for two terms in 1921-25. The younger Baxter is principally known for securing Baxter State Park and Mackworth Island for the people of Maine. Governor Baxter used this summer house until 1943, when he donated the property to the State of Maine. The School for the Deaf, founded in Portland in 1857, moved to the island in 1953. Over the next four years the school buildings were erected, in part using funds donated by the former governor. Renamed the Baxter School for the Deaf, the institution was constructed in the center of the island on land immediately adjacent to the house. The remainder of the island remains undeveloped and open to the public.

Architect Frederick Thompson designed a house which depended largely on the materials used - dark red Tapestry brick walls, green terra cotta roof tiles and fieldstone foundation - for exterior ornamentation. Only the classical porticos over the two entrances display a more traditional architectural treatment. Even here, however, Thompson added curves to the raking cornices of each pediment to reflect the Rennaissance style curves in the roof and dormers.
