DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

(The Sail Loft - St. George (Tenant's Hbr.))

The Sail Loft, located in the Tenant's Harbor section of St. George was built in 1860 by Deacon Robert Long. The two and a half story building from the start was intended to serve multiple function: the first story contained a ships' chandlery (the R.Long & Son Store), the second story a sail loft, and the half story a storage area and a molding shop. The building was immediately adjacent to the Bean & Long Shipyard.

The Sail Loft is a large rectangular building in the Greek Revival style with gable roof, two internal end chimneys, and clapboard siding. A granite block foundation supports the structure. Restrained classical motifs are seen, including cornice and Doric pilasters at each of the four corners.

The main facade of the building faces south-east and is two stories high and seven bays wide. In the second story there are seven simple twoover-two windows, irregularly placed. The first story contains two double doors, four two-over-two windows, and a blocked up window.

The south-west and north-east ends of the building are two and a half stories high and originally seem to have been two bays wide. The northeast elevation contains two six-over-six windows in the half story, with two two-over-two windows in the second story; a third second story window was created and subsequently blocked up. There are no first-floor openings in this end of the building.

The south-west end of the building contains two six-over-six windows in the half story. The second story features two two-over-two windows flanking a simple door. Access to this entrance is provided by an external wooden stairway attached to the end of the building. The first story contains a blocked-up window and doorway.

The half-story windows at each end of the structure represent original sashes (6/6), as opposed to the more recent two-over-two sashes elsewhere.

Except for minor modifications to the building noted above, along with internal partitions on the second floor, the Sail Loft is very well preserved. None of the alteration to date is irreversable.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

During much of the 19th century the shores of Tenant's Harbor in the Town of St. George were lined with ships on ways in various stages of construction. Most of these were the famous "coasters", schooners of various sizes which handled the trade along the Atlantic and Gulf coasts and the West Indies. Carrying from Maine ace, stone, lime and lumber, these vessels were the backbone of trade in these waters until supplanted by steamships and the railroads. Over seventy of these durable crafts were built in this little community during the fifty years between 1820 and 1870. As further testament to the nautical flavor of the region the 1860 Directory for St. George listed 26 master mariners.

Today all that remains as tangible evidence of this heritage is the Sail Loft built by Deacon Robert Long in 1860. Sturdy and rugged, it is, in fact, a kind of time capsule. Except for some partitioning on the second floor the building is little changed. Originally it housed a ship chandlery on the first floor, called R. Long & Son's Store; a sail loft on the second floor, rented out to Elwell Jackson; and a molding shop on the third floor. Today the first floor still contains many of the furnishings of the old store.

In 1870, Robert Long's son, Whitney, went into partnership with Holly Bean to build schooners. During the next two years they built seven vessels on the land in front of the Sail Loft.

A nearly complete set of the records of the Long businesses during the period 1860 to 1874 was found in the building and these documents are now on loan to the Bath Marine Museum for classifications and study.

The Sail Loft, as a local landmark, is a reminder to the residents of Tenant's Harbor of a proud maritime heritage.



VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION

Beginning at a point of Commercial St. 75 feet north of its termination at the shore, proceed southwesterly 250 feet along an unnamed roadway to the southwest property line of the Sail Loft. Then proceed northwesterly 150 feet along this line at which point turn northeasterly and proceed 250 feet to Commercial St. and thence southeasterly along this street to the point of origin.
