The G. D. Callihan House is an example of the house type that proved to be the most popular in Prestonsburg during the 1920's and early 1930's, the "semi-bungalow." The house is built of brick in running bond with a side-gabled roof of green tile, an unusual feature for a house of its type. Its front porch has been partly enclosed to form a solarium. The house has remained exceptionally well preserved. Included in the nominated property is the house, its surrounding yard, and a new carport.

The house is sited on a level lot on the south side of West Graham Street between South Front Street and South Arnold Avenue, approximately one block south of the city's downtown business district. The house's environs are residential in character and include a number of bungalows and other 1920's-vintage dwellings, several late Victorian residences, and some modern houses. The Methodist Episcopal Church South occupies the northwest corne of West Graham Street and South Arnold Avenue, diagonally opposite the house.

The G. D. Callihan House stands one—and—a—half stories high is faced with a smooth—faced, dark—red pressed brick in running bond with a vertical course at the water table. Its facade is symmetrical, with a center doorway. The gently—pitched side—gabled roof features prominent and gabled dormers, with quadruple windows, on the front and rear slopes. Its front slope changes pitch as it extends over the front porch. The east half of the porch has been enclosed to form a sunroom. Although this treatment was usually done after the house was built, in this case it appears to have been original, or nearly so. Windows in both the main block and solarium are double—hung wooden sash with six pane upper lights; the dormer windows display nine—pane upper sash over single—pane lower lights. The front entrance displays an original sixteen—pane wooden door. The front porch is carried by square brick posts and has a plain brick balustrade. It is accented by a smooth stone coping and stone column capitals. The rear porch may have been modified; although the roof (with its exposed rafter tails) is clearly original, and the tapered wooden posts probably are as well, the wood decking and latticework appear to be new.

A prominent feature of the house is its roof of highly glazed green Spanish tile with original cap flashing and ridge ornaments. Since it is one of less than half a dozen tile roofs in the city, its presence on a house of comparatively modest stature is all the more surprising. Triangular knee braces accent the roofline.

Alterations to the property, as previously stated, have been minimal. The demolition of the original garage has diminished the integrity of the property as a whole. The house itself, on the other hand, has remained virtually unaltered. The most significant change to its exterior has been the addition of metal storm sash to the prime windows, an alteration that does not measurably detract from the house's appearance.

The G. D. Callihan House, built 1931-1932, is significant under Criterion C in the context of the architectural resources of Prestonsburg as an excellent example of the bungalow style as exemplified by early twentieth-century builders' guides. The bungalow was the predominant vernacular house style in Prestonsburg during the inter-war period, and the G. D. Callihan House exemplifies the type most common in the city, the so-called "semi"-bungalow. It is distinguished from other examples by its fine state of preservation and for its tile roof. The G. D. Callihan House's place in the context of the city's architectural history is discussed in greater detail in the context statement.

According to local historian Bill Callihan, this house was built by his uncle Grover Darbon Callihan during the Great Depression (1931-32). The house was constructed on land owned by the Callihan family since the nineteenth century. The elder Callihan, a physician, had the house built in stages as his finances allowed. At his death, the house passed to his niece Margaret May. Upon her death in 1978 it became the property of her son David Darwin May, Senior. The present owners purchased the house from May's estate in 1986. The house was constructed by the masonry contracting firm of Tom Ellis, Bill Hubbard, and Joe Harris, bricklayers who built many other houses in the city during the 1920's and 1930's.

The bungalow style, which was extremely well received in California during the early 1900's, enjoyed enormous nationwide popularity during the early twentieth century. Popularized by builder's guides, companies that sold mail-order house plans, and pre-cut home manufacturers such as Sears and Roebuck and the Aladdin Company, it became the predominant mass market house style of the inter-war period. The G. D. Callihan House is a rather late examples of the bungalow style. In many other localities the mode's popularity waned after the late 1920's. However, stylistic lag is typical of Prestonsburg, where a number of other styles from the Queen Anne to the International/Moderne were first introduced to the city after they had ceased to be fashionable elsewhere.

The house is being nominated on the basis of its architectural significance. However, it may possess additional importance for its association with physician Callihan, and future research may one day determine the role he played in the community.

10. Geographic Information

Beginning at a point in the south line of West Graham Street 150 feet, more or less, west of South Arnold Avenue; then proceeding in an easterly direction along the south line of West Graham Street a distance of 60 feet; then in a southerly direction at right angles to said street a distance of 167 feet; then in a westerly direction parallel with said street

a distance of 60 feet; then in a northerly direction at right angles to said street a distance of 167 feet to its south line: the place of beginning.

The nominated area includes the entire lot, containing the house, carport, and surrounding yard, and excludes other residences to the east, south, and west. This boundary includes all the property visually associated with the house and contributing to its significance. Areas adjacent to the property are described in Section 7.
