Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Hollywood Theater (c. 1937-1938) is located at 401 Delaware Street in Leavenworth, Leavenworth County, Kansas (pop. 33,656). The building has a southern facade orientation.

The Hollywood Theater is a stucco finished rectangular building measuring 108' deep, 48'3" wide, and 44' high. Its facade has the bold, sharply delineated composition of the later phase of the Art Deco movement. The interior contains numerous Art Deco features including distinctive murals and lighting fixtures. The most interesting interior space is the second level lobby, which is visually unified by use of bold, circular forms.

The theater was built with air conditioning, this system is still operable. The original Motiograph Mirrophonic sound system which permitted "the sound to range evenly to every seat in the theatre" is extant. The theater also retains its early Super Simplex projection system.

It has managed to maintain a surprisingly high degree of integrity. It now provides a home for the Performing Arts Center for the City of Leavenworth, a use which has necessitated some changes to the stage and proscenium, which were not originally designed to accommodate live theatrical performances.

The Hollywood Theater (c. 1937-1938) is being nominated to the National Register under criterion C for its architectural significance as an Art Deco theater. The Hollywood Theater is located at 401 Delaware Street in Leavenworth, Leavenworth County, Kansas (pop. 33,656).

The Hollywood Theater is Leavenworth's only movie palace. Its decorative Art Deco exterior and opulent interior treatments are hallmarks of the movie palaces that were built across America in the 1920s and 1930s. The theaters were designed to be showplaces, with sumptuous appointments, inviting the rich and poor alike to share the lavish surroundings and escape into celluloid fantasies. Built in 1937-1938 to the design of Robert Boller, it was part of the Dubinsky theater chain Boller Brothers were the prominent Kansas City. Missouri movie

theater chain. Boller Brothers were the prominent Kansas City, Missouri movie theater design firm responsible for many movie palaces built throughout the midwest and southwest. Some Boller Brother designed theaters in Kansas are the Fox in Hutchinson, the Fox-Watson in Salina, the Granada in Emporia, and the Booth in Independence.

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Edward Dubinsky acquired the downtown site that the theater stands on for \$10,090 in 1936. The Dubinsky Brothers (Irvin, Edward, and Bill) operated the theater from 1938 until 1947, when they sold the concern to H.L. Amusement Company, who operated the theater until 1969. Durwood, Inc. operated the theater until 1977 when it was acquired by the City of Leavenworth and has since been maintained by the city for use by the Leavenworth Performing Arts Council.

July 23, 1938 marked the opening night for the Hollywood Theater, 1,040 people attended the sellout performance. "Excited crowds filled the sidewalks and overflowed into Delaware street in front of the Hollywood before both the first and second shows." The opening night performance consisted of a Paramount news popular science feature, a Silly symphony cartoon, and a sports novelty, and the feature, "Little Miss Broadway," starring Shirley Temple, George Murphy, Phyllis Brooks, Jimmy Durante, and Edna Mae Oliver. Admission prices for the lower floor and loge seats were \$.35 and \$.25 for the balcony seats. The theater had a segregated section for blacks.

Dubinsky Brothers advertised that "family ties will be strengthened at the Hollywood Theater by providing a common meeting ground and upholding family ideals. Here you will meet your friends and tradesmen- for through the doors of this theater will pass the solid citizenry of the community."
