#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Colonial Hall, a seventeen-room building originally built to serve as a house and medical office, was designed in 1904 by Frederick Marsh. The design and architectural features of this three story frame building, which is constructed on a stone foundation, are all characteristic of the then-popular Georgian Revival style.

The symmetrical three-bay front facade of Colonial Hall is dominated by a semicircular portico. The portico consists of four two story free-standing Corinthian columns. The recessed entry, which is shadowed by the portico, is embellished with a two-tiered porch. The balustraded second story of the porch is supported by one story Corinthian columns. The corners of Colonial Hall are decorated with fluted pilaster strips which are capped with Corinthian capitols. Diminutive pilaster strips with Corinthian capitols flank each of the building's double hung rectangular windows. The high pitched hipped roof, which makes the interior attic space usable, is broken by two tall brick chimneys. The dentillated eaves appear as a classical cornice.

The interior of Colonial Hall has been preserved by the Anoka County Historical Society. The suite of three rooms on the north side of the first floor, which were originally used as a waiting room, consultation and electrical room, and an operating room, have been converted for use as offices by the county society. The remainder of the first floor, composed of a parlor, dining room, kitchen, bathroom, and pantry, is furnished in period pieces and serves as a museum and library. The basement is used for displays of agricultural and educational artifacts. The second floor is composed of bedrooms which have been furnished in turn of the century style. The most outstanding features of the interior, an oak spiral staircase, as well as the woodwork throughout the house, were manufactured by Reed and Sherwood, a prominent Anoka lumberyard.

In 1922 a two story brick Masonic Hall was constructed to the northeast of Colonial Hall. The simple Greek Revival design of the hall complements the design of Colonial Hall.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Colonial Hall, planned and built by Drs. Alanson and Flora Aldrich in 1904, is a significant historic and architectural building in Anoka. Historically this building is significant due to its association with the medical practice and the civic contributions of the Drs. Aldrich. Architecturally Colonial Hall represents the only well-preserved Anoka example of a Frederick Marsh designed Georgian Revival house. As the office and museum of the Anoka County Historical Society and the Anoka County Geneological Society, Colonial Hall continues to make a historical contribution to the county.

Dr. Flora Aldrich, a descendant of the Hudson Valley Knickerbockers, and Dr. Alanson Aldrich, a native of Massachusetts, moved from New York to Anoka in 1883. Prior to 1883 they had studied and practiced medicine together in Baltimore, Chicago, New York, London, Paris, and Vienna. Their Anoka practice was devoted to the treatment of eye, ear, nose, and throat ailments.

Dr. Flora Aldrich, civically active throughout her residence in Anoka, served in 1890 as the first president of the Philolectian Society, a women's social club. She also served as Vice-President of Anoka's first library board. As a noted author, Dr. Flora Aldrich contributed to various medical journals. In addition, she wrote <u>My</u> <u>Child and I</u>, a turn-of-the-century child rearing guide for mothers. Throughout her life she was a devoted member of both the Minnesota Medical Society and the American Medical Association.

Dr. Alanson Aldrich, who had established reknown in his field in Europe and on the east coast before moving to Anoka, maintained a medical practice for thritythree years in both Anoka and Minneapolis. Through his contribution to opthmology journals, Dr. Alanson Aldrich maintained a national reputation as an innovator in his field. He was a member of the Hennepin County Medical Society, the Minnesota Medical Society, and the American Medical Association.

In 1922, after the death of the Drs. Aldrich, Colonial Hall and its contents were sold to the Anoka Masonic Lodge. Soon after, the Masons constructed a two story Masonic Hall to the northeast of Colonial Hall. In 1971 Colonial Hall was leased to the Anoka County Historical Society. The Masons retain ownership and continued to meet in the hall.
