STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE			

The Mansion is of significance on several counts. B. F. Allen, Iowa's first millionaire, built the home, lived in it for only about five years, and in 1874 he was without finances, having tried to save a Chicago bank with which he was involved from bankruptcy.

The Architect was one of Chicago's great architects prior to the great fire, W. W. Boyington. Several persons who should know, have stated that Terrace Hill is the finest piece of Victorian architecture between Chicago and California. Earl Reed, who was National Chairman of the American Institute of Architecture Committee on Preservation, said, "Contrary to all other Victorian mansions that I have seen, Terrace Hill's woodwork is all solid wood; no graining was used on the first or second floors; the eight fireplaces are real; the detail is all in such perfect scale with the unusually large rooms and halls that one is misled as to the size of the rooms."


F. M. Hubbell purchased the home in the mid-1880's for \$55,000.00. His love for the house was far reaching; a trust he set up stipulated the maintenance of the home should keep it in near perfect condition. The Hubbell Estate is no doubt the largest estate in the state of Iowa.


Hubbell came to Iowa in 1855 at the age of 16 with his father. He liked Des Moines and stayed while his father returned east. His first job was for \$100.00 per year. He became the wealthiest Iowan in the history of the state. Hubbell was in almost everything going on in the then small town--utilities, real estate, insurance, law, and railroad.


The Hubbell family purchased the home from the estate and gave it to the state of Iowa.
